Palm/Passion Sunday with Holy Communion

PALM SUNDAY/PASSION SUNDAY

Palm Sunday/Passion Sunday is the epitome of Lent: a day of great celebration, and a day of deep mourning. On this day, Jesus entered Jerusalem as its king while thousands rejoiced. Within a week, he would be dead, and his followers would be confused and scattered.

We begin standing with those who welcome Jesus' entry into Jerusalem with loud "Hosannas" and cheers and rejoicing. The Messiah, the King who will restore the land to its rightful people, has come! He is the one who will settle accounts, restore good fortune, put to right injustices and bring people into line with the sword. "Hosanna!" we cry, connecting with the joy they felt, believing that the day of the Lord they had always envisioned was coming to pass, that the Kingdom they assumed God would establish was being called into being. We lay palm fronds at the feet of the one who comes, of the Messiah we've been waiting for.

But then, something happens, and the liturgy forces us to confront a sad reality about the great throngs that greeted Jesus at the gates of Jerusalem. We transition, with the crowd, from shouts of praise and Hosanna, to the Passion Gospel where we cry out, "Crucify him!" We learn, through participation, that the people who cheered so mightily at Jesus' entry into Jerusalem cheered just as mightily for his crucifixion. They realized that this was not the Messiah that they had wanted or expected.

Today and throughout Holy Week, we're called to examine our relationship with God, to examine what exactly it is we're hoping for, why exactly it is we claim to follow this carpenter from Nazareth. We're called to seek within ourselves any evidence that we have, like the crowd, decided to shout "Hosanna" because we have created a Messiah, a God, in our own image. We're here today, as well, to be reminded of the times when we have said, "Crucify him," by our actions and of the times we have rejected the truth and message of the Gospel by rejecting what it means for us and for all people.

MAUNDY THURSDAY

Maundy Thursday is observed during Holy Week on the Thursday before Easter. Also referred to as "Holy Thursday" or "Great Thursday," it commemorates the Last Supper when Jesus shared the Passover meal with his disciples on the night before he was crucified. Three important biblical events are the primary focus of Maundy Thursday solemnizations:

1. Before the Passover meal, Jesus washed the feet of his disciples. By performing this lowly act of service, Jesus "showed them the full extent of his love." (John 13:1). By his example, Jesus demonstrated how Christians are to love one another through humble service. For this reason, the practice of foot-washing is a part of the Maundy Thursday service.

2. During the Passover meal, Jesus took bread and wine and asked his Father to bless it. He broke the bread into pieces, giving it to his disciples and said, "This is my body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." Then he took the cup of wine, shared it with his disciples and said, "This wine is the token of God's new covenant to save you--an agreement sealed with the blood I will pour out for you." These events recorded in Luke 22:19-20 describe the Last Supper and form the biblical basis for the practice of Communion. For this reason, Holy Communion is always celebrated on Maundy Thursday.

GOOD FRIDAY

Friday of Holy Week has traditionally been called Good Friday or Holy Friday. On this day, the church commemorates Jesus' arrest (since by Jewish custom of counting days from sundown to sundown it was already Friday), his trial, crucifixion and suffering, death, and burial. Since services on this day are to observe Jesus' death, and since Eucharist is a celebration, there is traditionally no Communion observed on Good Friday. Much is covered in mourning black, and altar candles are extinguished. They are left this way through Saturday, but are always replaced with white before sunrise on Easter.

EASTER

In our secularized culture, non-Christians have reinterpreted the "true meaning of Easter" to be "eggs, bunnies, the coming of spring, a time for families to gather..." It is a season of good feelings and the love of family and the enjoyment of springtime.

Not to appreciate the human longing for love and happiness would be dreadful indeed. Human beings, Christians and non-Christians alike, have a tremendous capacity for feeling, and Easter brings that capacity to open expression with great intensity. Rather than condemning these expressions of human emotion, Christians ought to acknowledge them and feel free even to enjoy and participate in them.

But Christians should also recognize, and help non-Christians to see as well, that the true meaning of Easter lies elsewhere. The meaning of Easter is Jesus Christ's victory over death. His resurrection symbolizes the eternal life that is granted to all who believe in Him. The meaning of Easter also symbolizes the complete verification of all that Jesus preached and taught during His three-year ministry. If He had not risen from the dead, if He had merely died and not been resurrected, He would have been considered just another teacher or Rabbi. However, His resurrection changed all that and gave final and irrefutable proof that He was really the Son of God and that He had conquered death once and for all.

However, Easter did not always symbolize Christ's resurrection from the dead, and the meaning of Easter was quite different than what Christians celebrate today. The feast day of Easter was originally a pagan celebration of renewal and rebirth. Celebrated in the early spring, it honored the pagan Saxon goddess Easter. When the early missionaries converted the Saxons to Christianity, the holiday, since it fell around the same time as the traditional memorial of Christ's resurrection from the dead, was merged with the pagan celebration and became known as Easter. The meaning of Easter was also changed to reflect its new Christian orientation.

Today, the meaning of Easter, for millions of Christians, is that of honoring and recognizing Jesus Christ's resurrection from the dead, and His glorious promise of eternal life for all who believe in Him.

THE BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER (BCP)

The Anglican Book of Common Prayer is a collection of ancient and modern prayers and worship services for occasions when the church community gathers. The use of a printed liturgy gives opportunity for all members to participate in worship. Scripture is the foundation of the Anglican Book of Common Prayer. Two-thirds of the Anglican Book of Common Prayer comes directly from the Old and New Testaments. The Anglican Book of Common Prayer is not meant to eliminate spontaneity or personal prayers. Every service in the book has opportunities for personal prayers and thanksgivings. The Anglican book of Common Prayer is also a great guide for personal devotions. Bold Type indicates words people are encouraged to speak or sing.



- 5. An animal like a small horse with long ears


