

"A New Vision in a New Normal"

According to George Barna, "Vision for ministry is a clear mental image of a preferable future imparted by God to his chosen servants and is based upon an accurate understanding of God, self, and circumstances." God uses our history and "glory days" as a spring board to launch us into the next phase of ministry. The past will not become the hero when it comes to the ministry journey of Wesley UMC. Every year we should expect God to do something new and exciting with and through our church. Therefore, we should anticipate this year even with the current challenges with extreme optimism, i.e., the belief that God is going to bless our church in a major way in spite of the Coronavirus crisis. And if we are going to be in a position to receive God's blessings, then we need "eyes" to see where God is taking us.

The gospel writers had a lot to say about the importance of vision in their stories about Jesus healing blind people. My favorite story is the healing of Blind Bartimaeus found in the gospel of Mark, chapter 10. And really his story is one of true discipleship, because authentic discipleship involves having the "vision" to continue the work of Jesus the Christ. In Mark chapter 10, there are three pictures of 'possible' discipleship. First, there is the rich young ruler in verse 17. He wants to be a disciple and follow Jesus in the way but he does not want to relinquish his riches nor his unscrupulous practices that allowed him to gain his wealth. He just couldn't envision himself doing that. As a result of 'affluenza,' he refuses to follow Jesus.

The next discipleship story is about the disciples in verse 35. James and John, the sons of Zebedee, had ambition to sit in positions of so-called power in Jesus' kingdom. However, they were blind to what true discipleship looked like under Jesus. Jesus has to remind all of his disciples that greatness would be defined by service and not by position or title. They did not have vision either.

Finally, the third story is of Blind Bartimaeus in verse 46. He is the hero of the passage and the only one that makes the right request. And because he asks for "vision," he receives it and models true discipleship by following Jesus in the way.

During this shelter-in-place season, we ask God for "vision" like Bartimaeus. We want "vision" so that we may see where God is leading us. We want both individual and collective "vision" to see how our great God is going to use every member of Wesley to make and/or be the difference in at least one person's life. We want eyes to see how our church can grow in every area. We want "vision" to see how our church can thrive with children and youth. We want "vision" to see how our outreach ministry can make a greater impact in the community once this pandemic is over. We want "vision" to see how our entire membership can grow more committed to God and each other after the pandemic is over. If we can "see" it, then we can be it. The God who sees all, and goes by the name "El Roi" ("the God who sees me"), is a God who specializes in "re-vision" for his people. Have a great week!

Willie Wilson Offers Free Masks — and Trouble for Lightfoot, Pritzker As He Readies Senate Run

When Willie Wilson turns up in the news, which is quite often these days, it should not be forgotten he is an announced candidate for the U.S. Senate. Wilson — whose latest gambit is to encourage the efforts of Chicago pastors who want to reopen their churches for services Sunday in defiance of Gov. J.B. Pritzker's stay-at-home order — says he'll run as an independent or third-party candidate against Sen. Dick Durbin in November.

"I do still plan on running," said Wilson, adding it will be easy to gather the necessary nominating petitions now that a federal judge has reduced the number of signatures candidates need to 2,500, down from 25,000. Wilson and other statewide candidates have until July 20 to submit their petitions under a modified order issued Friday by the judge, who eased the filing requirements because of complications created by the pandemic. "I've been busy with all these other things going on lately," Wilson said. "We'll get around to it, but I do plan on it." He certainly has been busy.

In the past week, it was inserting himself in the debate over whether churches are discriminated against by Pritzker's executive order limiting services to no more than 10 people in attendance at a time. That put him on a collision course with Mayor Lori Lightfoot, who wants city residents to abide by the stay-at-home plan. In the weeks before that, Wilson was busy handing out millions of free face masks himself. It is one of the ironies of the pandemic crisis that it hits Wilson's business sweet spot: Procuring medical supplies from China is a major part of how he became a millionaire.

Wilson gave Chicago aldermen what he said were 1 million masks to distribute. Then, he said he was giving out 5 million more on his own, which caused a stir when Lightfoot questioned how he could safely accomplish that. Wilson said he also has gifted masks to the Cook County Jail, the CTA, firefighters and police, two hospitals and 75 nursing homes and given \$1 million to people who are unemployed and another \$1 million to churches since the start of the crisis.

Am I saying everything Wilson is doing is because he's a candidate for the Senate? Durbin is a huge favorite in this increasingly Democratic state, especially in a presidential election year in which President Donald Trump is expected to fare poorly here. Still, these are strange times, with plenty of unforeseeable curves in the road between now and Election Day. Wilson received 59,072 votes for mayor in 2019 and was the top voter-getter in numerous African Americans wards. That was in a field that included Lightfoot and Toni Preckwinkle, so it's not unreasonable to think he might do even better against Durbin.

Little Known Black History Fact

Rudy Lombard

The late **Rudy Lombard** and his contributions to the Civil Rights Movement are little known, but that's exactly how the activist and leader wanted it. The New Orleans native made history with a series of sitins in New Orleans, immortalizing himself and other activists with their bold actions against racism. Lombard was born in Algiers, La. in 1939. He grew up witnessing widespread discrimination against Blacks, prompting him to become an activist. As a student at Xavier University, Lombard led a 1960 sit-in at the McCrory's Five & Dime store in protest of its Jim Crow laws.

Joining Lombard in his protests were what would be become known as the "CORE Four" – Lanny Goldfinch, a white man, Cecil Carter, Jr. and Oretha Castle, both of whom were Black. At the time, Lombard was the National Vice President of the Congress of Racial Equality and also the senior class president at his college. The case made its way to the Supreme Court and after its review; it tossed out the criminal mischief arrests in 1963. At the time, New Orleans didn't have any official segregation laws in place but they were still enforced. After earning a doctorate in urban planning from Syracuse University, Lombard became a prominent businessman.

A failed mayoral bid in New Orleans took place in 1985. Lombard finished a distant fourth but called to attention the city's need to develop better public housing options for its poor citizens. Lombard was also an author, writing a 1978 book with the late Nathaniel Burton titled "Creole Feast: 15 Master Chefs of New Orleans Reveal Their Secrets."

According to published accounts, Lombard was also friends with jazz great Wynton Marsalis. His brother, 4th Circuit Court of Appeals Judge Edwin Lombard, shared that the leader was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and kept the news quiet until early 2014. Lombard succumbed to the cancer on Dec. 13, 2014.

He was 75. As a CORE elected official and activist, many who were close to him have chosen to keep his legacy alive in a fashion he didn't do himself.

Although Lombard rarely acknowledged his achievements, his decisive actions helped to move the country forward.
