

"The Power of the Pentecost Season"

Greetings, family, in the name of the Lord Jesus the Christ! Although Pentecost Sunday is in our rearview mirror, we are still in the Pentecost season. Just as Easter is more than a day celebration but rather a season, so is Pentecost. Pentecost Sunday is a day we commemorate because it marks the birth of the Christian Church. On the day of Pentecost (A Jewish harvest festival), the Holy Spirit swept into the Upper Room where the disciples were, both male and female, and they began to praise God in other languages which amazed the crowd. It was a day when boldness replaced their fear and thousands joined the new Christian movement.

After that powerful Kairos moment, the disciples, led by Peter, began a discipleship journey that had them preaching truth to power, teaching truth to the masses, evangelizing to the lost, healing the sick, and meeting the basic needs of the poor. The Book of Acts describes the powerful "actions" of the disciples after they were all filled with the Holy Spirit. The Spirit of Jesus was now a part of their lives like never before. They were transformed men and women. They were different. They were ready for the adventure. They were ready for God to use them anywhere and at any time. Their holy boldness was contagious and wherever they ministered that place was never the same.

And guess what? Their powerful witness and works took place outside of the Temple and synagogue. They were so bold and confident that they ministered and preached in the marketplace. They knew the LORD was with them everywhere they went and not just in religious spaces. They were so influential and impactful that people began to say that they were turning the world upside down.

It hit me that if the Holy Spirit did that for them back in the first century, then the Holy Spirit can do that for us in the 21st century. That same Holy Spirit can give us holy boldness. That same Holy Spirit can give us fiery passion. That same Holy Spirit can give us preaching and evangelizing power. That same Holy Spirit can help us meet people's practical needs. That same Holy Spirit can help us eliminate scarcity and poverty. That same Holy Spirit can help us impact our community so that when others see Wesley United Methodist Church members they will say, "Look, they are turning the world upside down." (Or is it, right side up?) Take advantage of this Pentecost season by recognizing your God-given power to be a difference-maker. Have a great week!

When This Virus Has Passed, I Will Remember Freedoms Stolen Like a Thief in the Night

When this storm has finally passed, I will shake another brother's hand, slap hard fives, skin to skin, embrace like the best of friends. The way we used to. Before the arrival of coronavirus' cold winds. When this storm finally has been vanquished and it is safe to come out again, to break the barrier of personal space, to converse in intimate human circles over coffee or tea and chill, I will. And I will stroll slowly across golden sands for miles of beach. No city code to breach. I will speak to everyone I pass. Lie blissfully upon emerald blades of park grass.

Watch daylight pass as the orange-red sun sinks from a purplish evening sky and children's voices blend with the crickets' song while fireflies twinkle before their widened eyes. And though I no longer have a head of hair, I just might plop down in a barber's chair. Break my vow to allow someone beside myself to trim my beard. To rub my face with lilac tonic after lining me with a straight edge from ear to ear. When this storm is over, I will remember when freedoms taken for granted were stolen like a thief in the night. And at the end of the tunnel we could see no sure sign of light.

When hospitals and morgues were swollen with the sick and the dead. When the hourly news and our conversations were filled with caution and dread. Too many visions of gloved and masked humanity fill my head. Inescapable the daily count of the infected and the dead. Desolate streets and shuttered stores, people locked behind unwelcoming doors. Anxiety pours like gushing rain. Undeniable strain. Economic drain. Some of us muse that there may be lessons to gain from this storm. Perhaps joy after pain. And when this storm has finally passed, there will be no fear of pumping gas. No migraines over grocery shopping or using cash. No drive-up only restaurant orders and curbside pick-ups. No consternation over human touch.

I long for us to again be free ... I long simply to sit beneath the umbrella on the veranda of my local coffee house. Choppin' it up with the fellas, and chillin' out. Long to escape this frozen, quarantined world in which we find ourselves nowadays— reflecting on the way we once lived, loved and played. Remembering the way we were not that long ago. And longing to return, even as corona's cold winds still blow. But I can't help but wonder if we can ever return. Or is this the new normal? My heart still yearns. I miss the Saturday movie theater matinee. And by the time this storm passes, I will have missed the sights and sounds of children at play—frolicking at crystal sprinkling water fountains and swimming pools. The pound of the basketball and squeaking shoes. I miss the way we moved: Engaging as instruments in the human symphony of life. Breath-to-breath, hand-to-hand, eye-to-eye. When the storm passes, I hope we'll try.

Little Known Black History Fact

Blind Tom Wiggins

Thomas "Blind Tom" Wiggins was a blind piano prodigy so popular that it has been alleged that he was the highest-paid pianist of the 19th Century. Wiggins was celebrated for his ability, but his success came at the price of his dignity. Wiggins was born May 25, 1849 to slave parents, Charity and Mingo Wiggins in Harris County, Ga. The family was sold to Columbus lawyer, Gen. James Bethune. Because of Wiggins' blindness, he didn't work, but by age four, people noticed that Wiggins could imitate sounds and music. He then started to pick up piano notes and songs. Bethune sensed that the child was gifted and nurtured Wiggins with lessons and access to music.

By the time he was nine years old, Wiggins reportedly made as much as \$15,000 per performance, which were billed as "exhibitions." In essence, Bethune rendered Wiggins into a slave-musician who fattened the pockets of his owners. According to accounts, Wiggins could play his own takes on classic works from Bach, Chopin, Liszt, and Mozart along with using the piano to imitate other sounds. Because of his extraordinary memory, Wiggins became a novelty act and played games with the audience by playing their original compositions note for note.

If Wiggins could hear it, he could also play it, while adding his own flair. In 1875, Bethune gifted Wiggins to his son, John, who toured with the pianist for the next eight years. The younger Bethune eventually lost his ownership of Wiggins after he abandoned his wife, Eliza, who apparently connected with the piano player. After returning to Georgia after an extensive tour with Wiggins, the couple went through a bitter divorce and legal wrangling that also involved Wiggins' mother. In 1887, Bethune's ex-wife won rights to the "Last American Slave" as Wiggins was called in newspapers. While it appeared to be freedom, Wiggins was once more a slave-musician. Author Jeffery Renard Allen wrote a novel based on Wiggins titled "Song of the Shank," but uncovered a little-known side in his research. It was said that Wiggins may have been an autistic savant, but such a condition was not well known at the time. Wiggins also crafted his own music but was billed as uneducated. There have been efforts to find his original musical compositions to restore and preserve them.

Wiggins may have played a meek role to appease his owners but took back his pride in other ways. As his career waned, Wiggins refused to play back church hymns and he became increasingly defiant. His health began to fail him and he officially retired from performing in 1905. Three years later, he died to complications from a stroke. Wiggins' mother or family never benefited from the riches Blind Tom made.




