"The Power of the Pentecost Season"

Greetings, family, in the name of the Lord Jesus the Christ! Although Pentecost Sunday is seven weeks in our rearview mirror, we are still in the Pentecost season. Just as Easter is more than a day celebration but rather a season, so is Pentecost. Pentecost Sunday is a day we commemorate because it marks the birth of the Christian Church. On the day of Pentecost (A Jewish harvest festival), the Holy Spirit swept into the Upper Room where the disciples were, both male and female, and they began to praise God in other languages which amazed the crowd. It was a day when boldness replaced their fear and thousands joined the new Christian movement.

After that powerful Kairos moment, the disciples, led by Peter, began a discipleship journey that had them preaching truth to power, teaching truth to the masses, evangelizing to the lost, healing the sick, and meeting the basic needs of the poor. The Book of Acts describes the powerful "actions" of the disciples after they were all filled with the Holy Spirit. The Spirit of Jesus was now a part of their lives like never before. They were transformed men and women. They were different. They were ready for the adventure. They were ready for God to use them anywhere and at any time. Their holy boldness was contagious and wherever they ministered that place was never the same.

And guess what? Their powerful witness and works took place outside of the Temple and synagogue. They were so bold and confident that they ministered and preached in the marketplace. They knew the LORD was with them everywhere they went and not just in religious spaces. They were so influential and impactful that people began to say that they were turning the world upside down.

It hit me that if the Holy Spirit did that for them back in the first century, then the Holy Spirit can do that for us in the 21st century. That same Holy Spirit can give us holy boldness. That same Holy Spirit can give us fiery passion. That same Holy Spirit can give us preaching and evangelizing power. That same Holy Spirit can help us meet people's practical needs. That same Holy Spirit can help us eliminate scarcity and poverty. That same Holy Spirit can help us impact our community so that when others see Wesley United Methodist Church members they will say, "Look, they are turning the world upside down." (Or is it, right side up?) Take advantage of this Pentecost season by recognizing your God-given power to be a difference-maker. Have a great week!

Kim Foxx Wins Over Powerful Donors to Sign Her 'Pledge to Fight for Racial Justice'

We are the last ones to be invited into the room, and the last to be consulted. We are stereotyped, misunderstood, underestimated, and treated as second-class in a white man's world. For Black women, that experience pervades every professional arena — from corporations to the arts and entertainment to government and politics. Cook County State's Attorney Kim Foxx has lived it, from her rise from a troubled childhood in the Cabrini-Green housing project to becoming the first African American woman to serve as the county's top prosecutor.

Foxx has long felt "muted" by advisors and allies, she said last week. Told that she cannot wear her hair "natural." Told not to fold her arms in photos, for fear of being perceived as an "angry Black woman." Told she was not qualified, while white men with lighter resumes got ahead. "We don't talk about the subtle differences in how candidates of color are treated, particularly Black women, and oftentimes feeling very muted, feeling very unheard," she said.

She recently convened meetings with her campaign staff, consultants and donors, she said in an interview, and calling on them sign on to a "Pledge to Fight for Racial Justice." She told them, "It is no longer enough to say, 'I supported the Black woman candidate, and that shows that I care about race equity,' " Foxx said. "I want you to be able to look at, you know, your relationships, who you bring to the table" in the political infrastructure.

She is working to on making her own political operation a racial equity model and asking her supporters to diversify their own staffs, operations, communications and spending, among other initiatives. The pledge is detailed on her website. The Foxx campaign contracts with nine consulting firms, according to spokesperson Alexandra P. Sims. Most employ few people of color. After meeting with Foxx, eight of them signed on to the pledge, Sims said.

Pete Giangreco is a 30-year veteran and partner with the Strategy Group and has worked on many campaigns, including Barack Obama's presidential runs. While his firm "has always tried to reach out," Foxx helped convince him he needed to "double down," he said. He added four women to his Chicago staff, including three women of color, and credits "Kim's call to do more and do better. Everything that happened in the world, you know, made us internally just want to be more intentional about it.

Dozens of Foxx donors have signed on, among them Bettylu Saltzman, Chuck Lewis, Illinois State Sen. Heather Steans and her husband, Leo Smith, and Michael Sacks, part owner of the Chicago Sun-Times. "I want to see sustained attention and investment in equity in all aspects" of politics, Foxx said. Her pledge may be unprecedented in politics. It is certainly long overdue.

Little Known Black History Fact

Today, the Girls Scouts organization is made up of young girls from all races learning valuable life lessons, but that wasn't always the case. The organization was desegregated via the efforts of **Sarah Randolph Bailey,** who began her mission in the mid '30's.

Bailey, born 1885 in Macon, Ga., was a longtime educator and missionary who saw the value in troubled young girls and volunteered her time to provide guidance. After working at a Macon rehabilitation and detention center for girls, Bailey had the vision to organize young women for the Young Women's Christian Association's (YWCA) Girl Reserves group.

In 1935, Bailey gathered informal groups of Black girls and started giving them the opportunity to learn life skills and lessons, much like their white counterparts in the Girl Scouts. After organizing some 15 Girl Reserve troops in Georgia, Girl Scouts, U.S.A. took notice and invited Bailey to organize the first Black Girl Scouts troop.

The group was formally introduced as official Scouts in 1948. Bailey was also named the chairwoman for the Macon Girl Scout's Central Committee and earned the Thanks badge, the Scouts' highest honor given to an adult. In 1961, a permanent campsite was named in her honor. She also worked as a district and council leader. Bailey passed in 1972.

In 1994, The Macon Girl Scouts Center was renamed the Sarah Bailey Service Center. She has also been the subject of a dedicated exhibit at Macon's Tubman Museum.
