"Do It With Passion"

Well, family, we finished up with Extravagant Generosity which is one of the five practices of fruitful congregations. We have four more to go. Our new practice that we will study for the next four weeks is Passionate Worship. Passionate worship is worship that is dynamic, vibrant, intentional, joyful, reverent, and designed to facilitate an encounter with God. Passionate worship is worship that allows the individual to experience the presence and power of God through singing, praying, giving, praising, and hearing the preached word. Worship is important to the life of the body of Christ because it connects the believer to God and to fellow believers. Through worship, we remember the mighty acts of God, and through that remembering we stay connected to our great God. Through worship, we remember the unconditional love God shows us, and through that remembering we are empowered to show that unconditional love to our neighbors. Through worship, we sing the songs of Zion, which help us to remember what God has done in the past, what he is doing in the present, and what God will do in the future. Worship is where we meet God and where God meets us. It is a time of remembering.

Passionate Worship is necessary for Wesley because it is an entry point for new members to join us. The first encounter potential members and converts have with us is through our worship service. Usually, first-time guests are curious to know how the congregation worships. They have questions they come armed with, such as, does this congregation love God? Does the congregation give expression to their love via worship? Is there energy? Is there enthusiasm? Is there joy? And...Is there passion in their worship? Do they sing like they mean it? Do they pray like it is as essential as breathing? Do they give with cheerfulness? Is the word preached with passion? These are some of the questions first-time guests come with. And believe it or not, their questions are answered by the way we worship.

We must remember what Bishop Schnase says about worship: "God uses worship to transform lives, heal wounded souls, renew hope, shape decisions, provoke change, inspire compassion, and bind people to one another."

Finally, I believe passionate worship is worship that is done as if it were your last opportunity to worship God. When it is over, one should feel as if one has just worked out. That is how engaging and participatory it should be. Passionate worship is never meant to be a spectator sport. Furthermore, it is transportable. It is not just confined to the church building. Passionate worship can be offered anywhere at any time to an awesome God. The psalmist wrote: "I will bless the LORD at all times. His praise shall continually be in my mouth." Have a great week.

SUNDAY MORNING HEALTH CORNER

Slow the spread of Coronavirus with Cloth Face Coverings

The CDC advises the use of simple cloth face coverings to slow the spread of the virus and help people who may have the virus and do not know it from transmitting it to others. Cloth face coverings fashioned from household items or made at home from common materials at low cost can be used as an additional, voluntary public health measure.

Cloth face coverings should not be placed on young children under age 2, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the cloth face covering without assistance.

The cloth face coverings recommended are not surgical masks or N-95 respirators. Those are critical supplies that must continue to be reserved for health care workers and other medical first responders, as recommended by current CDC guidance.

How to Wear Cloth Face Coverings Cloth face coverings should -

- · Fit snugly but comfortably against the side of the face
- Be secured with ties or earloops
- Include multiple layers of fabric
- Allow for breathing without restriction
- Be able to be laundered and machine dried without damage or change to shape

Chicago Needs Leaders, Not Elected Officials Looking For Scapegoats

Hundreds of people swooped into Chicago's downtown area on Sunday night into Monday morning to smash in store windows and loot, seemingly out of nowhere, and the obvious question is whether this was premeditated and organized. Who first tweeted — inaccurately — that police in the Englewood neighborhood had shot an unarmed 15-year-old boy in the face? What was the tweeter's purpose? Who first urged young people, again via social media, to jump into cars and drive downtown? What was the intent? Who brought in that U-Haul truck into which looters threw stolen goods? If there was a design behind the mayhem, let's find out. Let's make arrests. When a city is a tinderbox, there's no room for people who light matches. What we can say for sure, though, is that Chicago's official response to the looting and property destruction, as well as to two shootings and months of escalating gun violence, has been anything but organized. There has been an utter lack of teamwork, and our city is paying the price.

Why, quite simply, did Mayor Lori Lightfoot and Cook County State's Attorney Kim Foxx hold dueling press conferences on Monday? Why did they not stand side-by-side on the same stage? The sun was barely up and storekeepers along Michigan Avenue were just beginning to sweep up the broken glass when Lightfoot held a press conference to deplore the looting, promise a tough police response — and blame Foxx. The looters on Sunday, she and Police Supt. David Brown said, were emboldened by the failure of Foxx's prosecutors to take earlier arrests for looting seriously. Because looters arrested back in May and June were not "prosecuted to the fullest extent," Brown said, looters today "act like there are no consequences of their behavior."

At a separate press conference later, Foxx shot back that Lightfoot and Brown had their facts all wrong, having lumped together looters and peaceful protesters. "I understand the superintendent's and the mayor's frustration. I share their frustration," Foxx said. "Looters have been charged and are awaiting trial. Peaceful protesters have not had their cases pursued." Foxx complained about "dishonest blame games" and accused Lightfoot of seizing on an "overly simplistic answer" to a complex problem.

Chicago needs leaders, not elected officials looking for scapegoats. It's not hard to make a case that every branch of the local criminal justice system — the police, the state's attorney's office, the sheriff's office and the courts — is in part to blame for the city's failure to curb violent crime rates and the kind of chaos we witnessed this weekend. But the underlying conditions driving Chicago's crime and unrest, from the impact of the pandemic to long-standing problems of economic and racial injustice to a palpable distrust of the police, are not about to disappear any time soon. Chicago needs leaders who are willing to sit down together, hash out their personal and philosophical differences and do a better job of working together.

Little Known Black History Fact

Harriet Jacobs

Harriet Jacobs was a former slave who penned an autobiography detailing her escape from an oppressive master who made sexual advances towards her. Jacobs became a darling of the anti-slavery movement with the publication of her book, *Incidents in the Life of a Slave Girl*, helping other slaves by way of her celebrity.

Jacobs was born into slavery in Edenton, N.C. in 1813. Jacobs wrote in her book that the first six years of her life, she didn't realize she was owned. After the death of her owner, she was given to a girl too young to be a master and fell under the rule of the girl's father, Dr. James Norcom, at age 12. When Jacobs turned 15, Norcom pursued her sexually though she rebuffed him at every turn.

Norcom's wife was well aware of her husband's insidious actions. He built a cottage four miles away just for Jacobs. She wanted to marry a free Black man but was refused, and instead got pregnant by an unmarried white lawyer. Jacobs thought this meant that Norcom would sell her but he was relentless in his pursuit and even took ownership of her two children. In the summer of 1835, Jacobs learned that Norcom was going to make her children work as slaves and that motivated her escape. With the help of neighbors both Black and white, she lived for a time in her grandmother's vermin-infested attic. For seven years, Jacobs was a fugitive, separated from her children.

In 1842, she finally boarded a boat and left North Carolina for Philadelphia and then took a train to New York. She was later reunited with her daughter and began working with abolitionists who were associated with Frederick Douglass' paper, *The North Star.* She eventually purchased her freedom after years as a fugitive, and was convinced by friends to write about her trials. In 1853, Jacobs began writing anonymous letters to the New York Tribune detailing her journey. In the letters, she broached the uncomfortable subject of sexual harassment and what mothers needed to do to protect their children from sexual predators.

In 1860, a year before the start of the Civil War, her memoir was finally published making Jacobs a global figure as the anti-slavery movement began to flourish. She used her fame and money to help other refugee slaves but the book fell into obscurity. After her death, the book was reprinted twice in 1973 and 1987, becoming an important account of what fugitive female slaves faced. By some historic accounts, Jacobs is considered the first person to create such a narrative.
