"Where Is Your Treasure?"

"For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Greetings in the name of the LORD! The remainder of the Month of September we will focus on the spiritual discipline of stewardship. Stewardship is defined as managing the affairs of God's local church by using everything God has blessed us with. It is an all-encompassing word that covers everything from your money, intellect, ingenuity, service, gifts, skill-set, and your time. It stems from the belief that everything that we have comes from God. I am in bible country: "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change" (James 1:17 ESV). Since we believe that everything that is in our hands is a gift from God, we can benefit by embracing the spiritual discipline of stewardship. We manage what God gives us. In God's economy, we don't own what God gives us we just manage it. It all belongs to God. How do I know? Because when we die, we leave everything behind. A rich African named Job can testify. He says, "We bring nothing at birth; we take nothing with us at death. The LORD alone gives and takes. Praise the name of the LORD!" (Job 1:21 CEV).

Speaking about stewardship is always a sensitive issue in the local church. More specifically, talking about finances among the faithful is a sensitive issue. Topics like faith, peace, love, joy, or ones that focus on Jesus performing miracles are more popular. Stories that mention how God likes to give us things and do things for us are more popular. However, don't you find it interesting how we love to hear how God gives to us but we cringe or downright rebel when we hear messages that challenge us to reciprocate God's love, i.e., to give God the best of our time, talent, and treasure. We are taught by the scriptures that Jesus had a lot to say about the dangers of the gods we make (money and materialism) crowding out the God who made us. If you believe in 'imago dei', that we are created in God's image, therefore if God is a giving God then we should be giving people. We are a reflection of God's image. To give is to be like God.

Bible readers realize that 16 out of the 38 parables Jesus taught dealt with money and possessions. In the Gospels, an amazing one out of ten verses (288 in all) deal directly with the subject of money. The Bible offers 500 verses on prayer, less than 500 verses on faith, but more than 2,000 verses on money and possessions (Source: Christianity Today; Jesus' teaching on money). Therefore, Jesus has an interest in where are treasure is for wherever our treasure is, there will our heart be also. I challenge us to treasure this local church and to put our heart (mind, and soul, too) into this local church so it can be a vibrant and vocal reminder that God is at work within us and this community. Never worship the gifts over the Giver of all gifts, who is God. I treasure God. And I know you do too. Therefore, let us repent of storing up treasure on earth, or making gods out of gifts instead of keeping the Gift-giver first in our lives. Have a great week.



Take It From Mama: Vote Smart and Vote Early

The voting experience in 2020 will be like none other in American history. Last week, North Carolina became the first state in the nation to launch its vote-by-mail effort this year, reportedly mailing out 600,000 absentee ballots. When we are not shuddering over the never-ending COVID-19 invasion, we are agonizing over the safety of the Nov. 3 election. I have never seen such intense interest — and fear — about an election in my decades of reporting on politics. This will be a record year for early voting and vote-by-mail. But how we worry:

Fears about in-person voting in a pandemic. Angst that election authorities will be overwhelmed. Trepidation that the U.S. Postal Service might not deliver. And there's always Donald Trump's constant baseless claims of election fraud, which have put even lifelong voters on edge. Not to worry. Mama is on the case. That's my Mama, a one-woman, get-out-the-vote whirlwind.

All summer, Ms. Gwen Washington has been part of a hearty troupe of senior citizens who are lobbying for early voting at their Hyde Park apartment complex. Mama dons her gloves, mask and dogged disposition to disperse information. She and her compadres regularly camp out at her high-rise building to advise residents and passersby on how to vote. She presses vote-by-mail ballot applications into the hands of every warm body she encounters, social distancing be damned. Mama is 86. She has never missed an election. Voting to her is as sacred as her three, precious grandchildren. "It's important to vote, and vote as early as you can," she exhorts. "Get those ballots, and get them in!"


And a national CNN poll taken last month shows that 34% of registered voters would prefer to vote by mail in the presidential election, while another 22% would prefer to vote early at a polling place. Only 43 percent would prefer to vote in person on Election Day. Voters may be engaged, but they are not informed, Mama says. The tales she hears raise alarm. One woman Mama encountered had recently moved to Hyde Park from Dolton but is still registered there. She asked: Can I request a ballot in Chicago? "No," Mama said.

I have been voting in Chicago, another voter confided, but live in Joliet. Will my vote be legal? "No." I don't trust the mail, said another. Should I take my chances and vote in person on Election Day. "No." (My mother is good with that word, take it from me). There are no excuses, she declares. Find out what you need to do. I promised I would help spread the word. Check with your election authorities in your

county or town. In Chicago, the board of elections advises: "Due to COVID-19, voters are encouraged to use vote by mail or early voting before Election Day on Nov. 3, 2020." Its web site, www.chicagoelections.gov, has everything you need to know — right now. Mama knows best.

Little Known Black History Fact

Rev. Florence Spearing Randolph





The **Rev. Florence Spearing Randolph** was one of the first Black women ordained as to preach and lead an African Methodist Episcopal Zion church. Rev. Randolph used her position in the pulpit to call out racism, gender inequality, and other issues related to social reform.

Florence Spearing Randolph was born in August 1866 in Charleston, South Carolina, moving north to New Jersey to work as a dressmaker, In the late 1800's, preaching became Randolph's true calling and she sought to become ordained in the A.M.E.Z. Church. The resistance from the bishops and church leadership was strong, but she was eventually ordained as a deacon in 1901, and as a church leader in 1903, where she also gained her license to preach.

In 1925, Rev. Randolph was elected to lead Wallace Chapel A.M.E.Z. Church in Summit, New Jersey. She became known for her powerful lectures and sermons, and famously preached that white people mistreating Black people across the nation went against the very root of Christianity.

Rev. Randolph was the first Black woman to enroll in Drew University in New Jersey, and there is now an annual award named after her given to a Black female student who shows promise as a church leader and preacher.


