### "The Mission of the Church is to Make Disciples"

It was Dietrich Bonhoeffer who said that "salvation is free but discipleship is costly." Mr. Bonhoeffer was intrigued by what he called the "cost of discipleship". In fact, he was so intrigued by it that he penned a book with the same title. In the book, he argues that modern-day Christians prefer a sanitized version of Christianity that allows them to do anything they want without being asked to submit or sacrifice for the sake of the gospel. He argues that modern-day Christians want 'cheap grace.' To him, cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance, baptism without church discipline, communion without confession. Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, and grace without Jesus the Christ." To follow Jesus is a costly endeavor. And I don't mean cost as in money. I mean "costly" as in it will cost you something like your time and talents, your energy and focus. Jesus gave His life to give birth to the church. The least we could do is to continue His work of building it up.

Since we are disciples of Jesus and therefore followers of Jesus it behooves us to truly follow Him. Bible readers recognize that Jesus had a mission to save those who He considered 'lost' because their connection to God had been severed. In Luke chapter 15 we see His theology of the lost unfold. When He is criticized for sharing table fellowship with known sinners such as tax collectors and people who could or did not adhere to the Mosaic Law, he tells three parables in chapter 15. And all of the parables have the same message: Heaven rejoices and has a party when one sinner reconnects with God. Evangelism is a rewarding yet costly endeavor. One we must engage in if we are going to be a church that makes disciples out of unbelievers and unchurched people.

According to Sam Chan, author of Evangelism in a Skeptical World, "the essence of evangelism is the message that Jesus Christ is Lord. Evangelism is our human effort of proclaiming this message—which necessarily involves using our human communication, language, idioms, metaphors, stories, experiences, personality, emotions, context, culture, locatedness—and trusting and praying that God, in His sovereign will, will supernaturally use our human and natural means to effect his divine purposes." Evangelism is a rewarding yet costly endeavor. It will inconvenience you. It will move you out of your comfort zone. It will cause you to do things you never thought you would do. It will cause you to express your faith. It will cause you to share your story of how God saved you. It will cause you to be transparent in order to share your testimony with coworkers, friends, and family. It will cause you to face rejection by those who don't have time to hear what you have to say.

Our theme for the month of October is "Making Disciples". This month we will creatively come up with ways to fulfill our mission to make disciples by focusing on the ministry, message, and methods of Jesus to seek and save the lost. Believe it or not, Jesus is not supposed to be a secret. Please read Matthew 28:18-20. Have a great week.

### 'All Our Lives, We've Had to Fight'

"Oh that my head were waters, and mine eyes a fountain of tears, that I might weep day and night for the slain of the daughter of my people!" Jeremiah 9:1

Dear Chicago of 100 years from now, I write to you from the year 2020, at a tempestuous time — a time when Black Lives still don't matter. A time of a world pandemic — amid its claim, so far, of nearly 210,000 American lives and more than 7.3 million infections. Amid the mounting threat of nationwide social chaos, and the swell of hateful racial chatter that seems to be pushing this country to the brink of explosive disaster.

I write with a heart broken by the centuries-old travail of my people, still regarded as inhuman beasts. As if we, of the Negroid race, are not created equal and endowed by the Creator with certain inalienable rights. All our lives we've had to fight. I write to you, dear future Chicago, as a native son, born in the hometown of Emmett Louis Till. Reared in this broad-shouldered city of segregation that is segregated still. Where life for Black folk in DuSable's town is a bittersweet pill and no crystal stair.

Where the public education system is still separate, unequal and patently unfair. And 401 years after African slaves stepped shackled upon America's shores, we are, as free men, no less abhorred. And the daily peril of living while Black in America, of walking while Black, of driving while Black, of talking and breathing and sleeping while Black is our daily crucible. Racism institutional. And the weight of this historic burden upon the backs of Black folks' so damn irrefutable.

Where the "problem" of the 20th century — as Du Bois identified it 117 years before my dispatch — is still, in the 21<sup>st</sup> century, the "color line." For justice in America still is not colorblind. Our prophets and our sons and daughters, America has slaughtered. From Dr. King to Breonna Taylor, our Black Bodies she has ruptured. We say their names: Trayvon Martin, George Floyd and Eric Garner... Innocent blood cries from premature graves. But America answers again and again: "No justice today."

No justice. It just is. Today I see a Chicago that rises to protect property and the shimmering Magnificent Mile more fervently and expeditiously than it does Black lives. An America that inflicts upon us violence then expects us to sit nonviolently silent. A news media that is appalled by "violence" against ATMs. That perpetuates stereotypes with jaded views that fill print pages and nightly news that daily miss our story. We are mere shadows in their allegory. And this has become crystal clear, though it is of no surprise: This city cares more about a damn horse than it does Black lives. Inasmuch as I am an optimist, it is hard during this current state of affairs to keep my sight, to still see the light. For the Black body is assaulted all day and all night.

Except, even as racism seems to hasten its pace toward our demise, like Maya Angelou, I sing, less hope should die: "You may kill me with your hatefulness, But still, like air, I'll rise." We sing: "Still we rise..." Even with tears in our eyes. O Lord, hear my cry.

# Little Known Black History Fact

### Anna Julia Cooper

Born into slavery, **Anna Julia Cooper** had the odds stacked against her but rose above her circumstances. Today, 56 years after her passing, is the 160<sup>th</sup> birthday of the Black feminist icon, activist, and scholar. Anna Julia Haywood was born to a slave mother and their owner in Raleigh, North Carolina in 1858. She attended high school at what is now known as St. Augustine's University in Raleigh before entering Oberlin College and earning both a bachelor's and master's degree in Mathematics. She worked at Wilberforce University and St. Augustine's before heading to Washington, D.C. to teach high school. In 1877, she married George Cooper, who died when she was just 21.

It was in Washington that Cooper crossed paths with **Mary Church Terrell**, the co-founder of the National Association of Colored Women. In 1892, alongside Helen Appo Cook, Cooper co-founded the Colored Women's League. That same year, Cooper released her first book, *A Voice from the South: By a Black Woman of the South* and became a notable civil and women's right champion.

It was during this period that Cooper became perhaps the most vocal advocate for equality for Black women, stating that the nation would become stronger on the backs of educational fortification for the oppressed segment of the population.

At the age of 67, Cooper became just the fourth African-American woman to earn a Ph. D. from the University of Paris in France. The AKA sorority sister also performed several speeches and wrote dozens of essays related to her life's work. She also became aligned with the Black Liberation movement, among several other academic and social pursuits. Cooper is also the only woman quoted in the U.S. passport book, with this quote:

"The cause of freedom is not the cause of a race or a sect, a party or a class – it is the cause of humankind, the very birthright of humanity." – Anna Julia Cooper

Professor, author and former MSNBC personality Melissa Harris-Perry founded The Anna Julia Cooper Center on Gender, Race, and Politics in the South at Wake Forest University in North Carolina. Anna Cooper lived to the age of 105, passing in February 1964 in Washington, D.C.
