

"We Have Work to Do!"

"For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also." James 2:26

Greetings, family, in the name of our risen Lord! We are privileged to be in the house of the Lord on the Lord's Day. The purpose of being in the Lord's house is to be equipped for ministry. We gather every week to be inspired, motivated, and challenged to identify and then use our spiritual gifts to edify, or build up, the body of Christ called church. We are to be engaged in ministry when we are outside the physical church building. Sunday morning is the time when we gather together to listen to the voice of God in order to figure out where God may be leading us in the new week. I challenge everyone to be challenged and then changed by the Word of God when it comes to doing the work of ministry. In Ephesians 4:11-12, Paul writes, "The gifts He (Jesus) gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ." This should provide us ammunition to come up with a new paradigm for clergy-laity relationships. The description for any church leader is that of a "gift". Pastors are gifts to the congregation. Church leaders are gifts to the congregation. The purpose of church leadership is to equip the saints, i.e., the rest of the church folk, for the work of ministry so that the church might be built up. Church leaders, pastors and parishioners, are gifted so that they might lift it, i.e., the church!

Since God has appointed church leaders to equip the saints for the work of ministry, guess who is supposed to do the work of ministry? You are! The burden of ministry does not rest solely on the strong but narrow shoulders of the pastor. No, the burden of ministry rests with the saints. If you are a child of God, then you are a saint. The text says that the responsibility of ministry rests on the collective shoulders of parishioners. Now, it is the responsibility of the pastor and church leadership to equip the saints for the awesome task of ministry. Well, how are the saints to be equipped? Saints have to be present for every "equipping" opportunity, like worship, Sunday school, bible study, prayer meeting, revivals, and district and local church training events. These events are designed to provide the saints with the necessary tools needed to make disciples of Jesus the Christ.

God has given the church an enormous responsibility---to make disciples. This involves preaching, teaching, healing, nurturing, giving, administering, building, and many other tasks. We couldn't do all these if we had to do them as individuals but God calls us to do these things as His collective agents of transformation. Together we can accomplish all these things. That is why we need EVERYONE to get involved in the "ministry work" of the congregation. That is why we emphasize making disciples because the responsibility of the church is so great, we need as many people as possible to help us do what we are called to do. Teamwork makes the dream work. Anything worth having is worth working for. We cannot accomplish anything without the power of WORK. I think we should want all of Chicagoland to know that Wesley United Methodist Church is a great church because the people have a mind to work! Have a productive week.

Dear Blago, I Am Not Your 'Homie'

Dear Blago, I am not your "homie." And for that matter, Dear Republican Party, Donald Trump and various Trump homies now going to and fro, seeking whom you may devour — I mean, trolling desperately for Black male votes — neither am I your Negro. I'm not Kanye. Not Ice Cube. Not 50 Cent. Not the Reverend Dr. Darrell Scott. And I'm not for sale. Not falling for the political okey-doke. Not today, not tomorrow, not ever. Not that I blame you for trying, dearest former Illinois Gov. Rod R. Blagojevich. Hell, if Trump had granted me early release from the federal slammer, he'd have my vote — and my loyalty — for life. And what's up with this apparent sudden focus on courting the Black male vote for Trump?

As a lukewarm, lifelong Black male Democrat, please allow me to respond in the vernacular: "My man, y'all barkin' up the wrong tree. Y'all trippin' — for real." Capisce? Now, I would be remiss to think I speak for all Black men. Clearly, I don't. We are not monolithic. Little Known Black History Fact

George Edwin Taylor

According to some reports, **George Edwin Taylor** was the first Black person selected by a political party to run for president.

Taylor was born in August 4, 1857 in Little, Ark. to a slave father and free mother. He eventually settled in Wisconsin, attending Wayland University in the state before moving into labor politics and working as a newspaper columnist.

Becoming a fixture of Wisconsin's still-prominent labor movement, he relocated to Iowa and involved himself in politics while also running his weekly newspaper, *The Negro Solicitor*. Taylor's prominence in political and civil rights circles became something of note when he became president of the National Colored Men's Protective Association, and aligned with the National Negro Democratic League, an organization of Black Democratic Party members.

In November 1904, Taylor was named the presidential nominee for the National Negro Liberty Party. Also known as the National Liberty Party, it was said to be the first political party created for and by Black people.

The failed bid proved that Taylor had influence among Black independents at the turn of the century. This occurred as the GOP began focusing on the North while conservative Democrats dominated political channels in the South. Taylor moved to Jacksonville, Fla., living out the rest of his days as an organizer with the local YMCA while still dabbling in newspapers and journalism.

Taylor passed in 1925 at the age of 68. <u>Shirley Chisholm</u> is the first Black presidential candidate for a major political party. In 1848, <u>Frederick Douglass</u> received a single vote as a presidential candidate for the Liberty Party but most view the gesture as symbolic more than anything.


