"Play the Game of Life with Gratitude"

In John Ortberg's book, When the Game is Over It All Goes Back in the Box, there is a chapter entitled "Play with Gratitude." The message of the chapter is simply "Live life with an attitude of gratitude and it will be more fulfilling than you could ever imagine." In that chapter, the foundational scripture is Luke 17:11-19, the story of Jesus healing ten lepers but only one returning to give thanks. The Lukan story shows us that ingratitude is a sin and a travesty. Gratitude is our ability to open up our hearts, eyes, and minds to recognize the goodness of God in all that God has blessed us with. Only through the lens of gratitude can we appreciate all that God has provided for us. Counting our blessings gives us the opportunity to be more thankful to God for things ranging from the simplest to the complex.

Sometimes we take the simple things for granted but we need to remember that God has been good to us in a number of ways that for the most part we have failed to appreciate. One of the ways we express gratitude to God is through praise and worship. Praise is a form of gratitude that is expressive and unmistakably intentional. Praise is something we do in the church and outside of the church, but especially in the church. If we were grateful to God for everything God has provided for us, then this church would be "jumpin" every Sunday morning.

I am grateful for Wesley United Methodist Church. I am grateful for the all of the challenges that we are confronted with because adversity doesn't build character it reveals character. We have some 'sho-nuff' character at our church. We are strong saints. We are mature saints. We understand that the church's mission is to be witnesses for Jesus everywhere and to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. I am grateful because I know that if God be for us who can be against us? I am grateful because I know "that all things work together for good to those who love God and are called according to His purpose." I am grateful because "we can do all things through Christ who strengthens us." I have learned to be grateful for everything God has placed in my pathway because it all has helped me become the man of God I am today. The same applies to you also. You would not be who you are today if God had not allowed you to experience some good, some bad, and some ugly. Be grateful for what God is doing in your life. Whatever God is doing in your life, it is for your own good.

Grateful people are full of great potential and possibility. Grateful people can see possibilities in people, places and things that ungrateful people can't see. Viewing life through the lens of gratitude allows us to live strong and accomplish great things for the glory of God. A healthy attitude empowered by gratitude can lift us to the altitude we want to get to.



HPV and Cervical Cancer

More than 2,000 Black women are diagnosed with cervical cancer every year. Black women are also nearly 2 times as likely to die from cervical cancer as white women. Yet, cervical cancer can actually be prevented through vaccination and routine screening!

All women are at risk for cervical cancer. Having a long-lasting infection with certain types of the human papillomavirus, also known as HPV, is the main cause of cervical cancer. It is estimated that at least half of sexually active persons will have HPV at some point in their lives, but only few women will get cervical cancer.

Cervical cancer is highly preventable in most Western countries because screening tests and a vaccine to prevent HPV infections are available. When cervical cancer is found early, it is highly treatable and associated with long survival and good quality of life.



If You Are 21 to 29 Years Old

You should start getting Pap tests at age 21. If your Pap test result is normal, your doctor may tell you that you can wait three years until your next Pap test.

If You Are 30 to 65 Years Old

Talk to your doctor about which testing option is right for you-

- A Pap test only. If your result is normal, your doctor may tell you that you can wait three years until your next Pap test.
- An HPV test only. This is called primary HPV testing. If your result is normal, your doctor may tell you that you can wait five years until your next screening test.
- An HPV test along with the Pap test. This is called co-testing. If both
 of your results are normal, your doctor may tell you that you can wait five
 years until your next screening test.

Time for the GOP to Tell Trump It's Over

So while all of the emperor's attendants and subjects let him parade around naked, pretending to see what wasn't there, a young child shouted out the truth: "He hasn't got anything on."

In "The Emperor's New Clothes: A Lesson for the 21st Century," author Greensleeves Hubs writes: "The Emperor's self-importance is boosted by having a whole bunch of obsequious 'yes men' around him. None of these 'yes men' is prepared to question his judgment and none of them is prepared to say or do anything which might damage their standing in their ruler's eyes." I don't have to tell you who the emperor is in the present situation. The GOP leadership has sacrificed the very soul of the party to cater to Trump. And, now, with the numbers of COVID-19 infections skyrocketing, Trump has been out playing golf. I used to think that the folks who worry that our democracy is in peril were over-reacting. But every day that Trump continues to spread rumors about voter fraud and to disrupt the transfer of power brings us closer to widespread unrest. We can't ignore that there are a lot of gullible and extremist Trump supporters that believe every lie that comes out of his mouth. His refusal to admit defeat and graciously go away isn't just ugly. Little Known Black History Fact

Ruth Simmons



Ruth Simmons has achieved a series of historic firsts. At a point in life where most are retired or soon will be, the longtime educator and academic is still going. Simmons is currently the eighth president of Prairie View A&M University, coming out of retirement to become the first woman to lead the institution.

Simmons was born July 3, 1945 in Grapeland, Texas as the youngest of 12 siblings. Her parents were sharecroppers who relocated to Houston. She entered and graduated from Dillard University in 1967, then earned a master's and Ph.D. in Romantic Literature from Harvard University in 1970 and 1973 respectively.

A series of academic positions with schools such as the University of New Orleans, California State University-Northside, University of Southern California, and Princeton University followed. She also served as provost of Spelman College.

In 1995, Simmons marked her first big achievement by becoming president of Smith College making her the first Black woman to lead a major college or university. She then joined Brown University in 2001, becoming the first Black president of an Ivy League institution and brought sweeping changes to the school.

At the urging of her brother Clarence, a former student and athlete at Prairie View, Simmons took on an interim presidential position with the school and decided to stay. Part of her reasoning is that many Prairie View students are poor and lack proper guidance and an example such as herself. Further, the school has issues graduating students due to the financial woes of the student body which Simmons hopes to address and correct.
