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III. Hebrews 12:5-11

IV. Principles To Remember In Disruptive Moments

A. Disruptive Moments Are Often Divine Appointments

Zechariah 2:8 - "apple of His eye." Isaiah 59:19 - "enemy comes in like a flood." Isaiah 43:4 - "We are precious in His sight." Philippians 4:19 - "Limitless resources to meet our needs." 2 Thessalonians 2:16-17 - "Everlasting consolation" Psalms 37:1, 6 - "A defense against our enemies."

B. Progress Without Pain Is Not Possible

"Storms (disruptive moments) always leave us with a list of things to clean up and fix. They are times when God restores to us the things we lose through negligence, ignorance, rebellion, or sin. For the Christian, storms are a no-lose proposition. They help us yo see and acknowledge the loose shutters, missing shingles, and rotten fence posts in our lives while turning us back to the only One who can make the necessary repairs." - Ron Mehl (Surprising Endings, 1993)

D. Disruptive Moments Produce Dynamic Growth

Botanists tell us that plants grow more during times of stormy weather than during peaceful, warm days — their roots actually dig down deeper when the strong winds blow. Then when the calm days return, the new roots provide a deeper foundation for the new growth. That is the way it should be with us.

E. What We Receive From Disruptive Moments Depends Upon How We Respond

The right question is never, "Why God?" It is always, "What, Lord? What do You want to teach me through the disruptive moments? Take me around and through the bend in the road as my teacher. Don't let me miss anything that You want me to see and learn."
