And Still We Rise

Very few of you are old enough to have lived during WWII. You know about it from history books, historical novels, what your parents may have told you, etc. I was 9 years old when the war ended. I still remember that time very well. I still cringe when I hear a siren, reminding me of the frequent air raid drills to prepare us in case of a *real* raid. My bedroom was in the attic, a very lovely room my mother had decorated especially for a little girl. It was my private space, my retreat, but at night when the stairs creaked, I was frightened to death that the *Japs* were coming to get me and was too afraid to run down the stairs for fear I would run right into one of them. I didn't know we were German, nor did I know if that fact was deliberately concealed or if I just didn't realize it. I had no idea what was going on in Germany, nor that some ancestor of mine might have been a Nazi. I never even thought about that until about 25 years ago when that possibility hit me between the eyes.

I was mainly concerned with crushing tin cans for "the cause." I found it disappointing that my mother seldom had enough sugar to make cookies, especially missing them at Christmas. I remember going to my friend's house (her father was my dentist) at Easter time to find their buffet lined with chocolate chicks and rabbits. I proposed to my father that he ask Dr. Hummel where he got them since we had not a piece of candy in the house. He responded that he probably got the candy at the Black Market, so I insisted my father tell me where that market could be found. I remember my parents only had coffee occasionally because we didn't have enough ration stamps to buy it, not that any was available.

There were two flags in the bay window in the living room, one for my sister who was in the WAVES, the other for my brother who was a Naval officer aboard ship in the Pacific. I recognized my mother's fears that she may lose a precious son and daughter, especially concerned that my brother might die at sea, which he very nearly did when his friend, the ships doctor, was struck by a Kamakaze minutes after my brother went below deck. He told of packing up his friend's belonging and sending them back to his wife.

I didn't have to stay home. I was free to go to school, or run to the store for my mother. Church was still happening, and I could play with my friends, but I will never forget that time. It marked me for life. On 9/11, I was in Kansas to celebrate my grandson's 5th birthday. We sat out on the driveway on the night that people were asked to put candles in their windows. The first planes flew over since before the devastation occurred. Suddenly, so many of my WWII experiences flew into my mind and I started telling my daughter and her husband how it had all affected me as a young child, something I had never done before. It was a time of great fear, hardship, and sacrifice, **But still we rose.**

Then there was the Korean War, Vietnam, and we are still in Afghanistan, *But still we rise.*

There is fear, disbelief, ignorance, disregard for the danger to self and others and conspiracy theories. *We continue to rise.*

We call ourselves a Christian nation, but our behavior is frequently less than Christian. We will ALL be changed by the Pandemic. Our children and grands will always be marked by it as will we.

But those of us who believe in and trust in God know that We will ALWAYS rise, Praise be to God!

Ponderings

It is hard to believe that we have been in this new place as a society, nation, and world for over 9 weeks, and though we have been asked to stay home, I have found that I have been busy with church work and also house work. Yet, as I have reflected on this time, I have realized that there are several things I have missed.

The main thing I have missed is physical touch, and the need for a hug from another human. Last Thursday afternoon, I went to at Juleeauna Jones' drive-by graduation party from elementary school, and I thought it was a "drive by" to say hello and keep going. Instead it was a "park and get out to talk to people." So Juleeaunna comes running over and asks, "Can I give you a hug?" "Oh yes," I said. And it was the most amazing hug I have had in a long time. Even though hugging is still on the "be cautious list," we as humans are created for community.

Another thing I have missed is having time to talk to someone in depth without discussing the virus or pandemic or the statistics of it. Yet, it has permeated all conversations and though we might not talk about it in particular, it is ever present in the conversation. So I am trying to set some time aside to reflect on life and on where we are as people and as a church family.

The third thing I have missed is corporate worship where I can see you when leading worship. I understand that recording the service and making it available online is our best way right now. So when I am recording my portions, I imagine our church family gathered. I can see individuals and your faces. Yet when I am finished recording and get it uploaded to Ed Updyke to put together, I know that I have not seen you with my eyes, but with my heart.

So what have I learned in this time? What is it that is the gift we have been given from this opportunity? How has God been at work in the world and in our church? For I believe that God does not cause the bad things to happen in this world, but that God is able to work a new thing, a good thing in the midst of the difficulties and struggles of our life.

One thing I have learned is how to work technology. Frank was so much better at this than I ever was. He wanted to get a new tablet or phone, and I was happy with the old ones. So in this new time for me, I use "his" computer at the house, and have had to figure out how to record parts of worship and the daily update videos as well as run Zoom meetings. The thing I have gained is that I have become comfortable with lots of new parts of technology. So in my home study, I am surrounded by technology instruments. I have an iPad for my daily Zoom meetings (usually at least 2 and sometimes as many as 4 a day), as well as conferences and webinars. I have my cell phone and my house phone as well as a desk top computer where I do my writing and corresponding (emails mostly). I have an outlet to plug in the things that need recharging as well as a printer that likes to make strange sounds at times.

I have also learned that we are in a new place in time and in history. As a leader, I am to continue to move forward and not be so quick to go back to the way things were on March 1. I am reading an interesting book entitled, How to lead when you don't know where you are going by Susan Beaumont. When she wrote it, she didn't have any idea that the world and the church would be where we are today. But her premise is that we are in that in-between time. We are between what was and what will be. There is lots of uncertainty in this space and time as well as lots of questions. Where are we going? How long until we get there? What will the future be like? The problem is there are very few answers at this point.

But there is something I do know. God is with us in this in-between time, and God is at work doing a new thing in us as individuals and as a church family and as a world. Yes, I would like to be in the next stage already, where we can return to some kind of normalcy. But honestly, I don't think that is in our future. We are going to have to take what we have learned and to reconsider how to be church and how to be community. With God's compassionate leading, we together will get there. Where? I don't know. But I have hope and great expectations about what lies ahead. So I hope you will trust God and trust me and the session as we seek to lead into this new time.

"What's Next" Report

A taskforce of Ann Aichinger, Jenna Wagner, Rob Hollo, Mike Vollmer, Linda Waldron, John Barker, and Robert Campbelle met on Saturday, May 16, by Zoom to begin the conversation about having in-person worship at Central Presbyterian. We discovered that there are more questions at this time, but in looking at the science behind the virus, as well as the Virginia Governor's plans for opening Virginia, the following information was reported to Session and approved:

We will work to have our first in-person worship opportunity on Sunday, July 5. We are still working on the details, but we are not making decisions out of urgency or panic. Instead, we see that it is important to consider the best way forward in this time of uncertainty and to be mindful of individuals involved in our church family.

We are working on establishing how to conduct worship and in which worship space. Everyone attending in person will be required to wear a mask or face covering to limit droplets of saliva being spread. We are encouraging people to consider your own safety and situation as to whether you are able to attend.

Meanwhile, Central Presbyterian worship will continue to be recorded and available on the website for viewing (CentralPresBristol.org). Please continue to pray for this group to have wisdom and to follow God's guiding as we move forward together in this time.

The Session of Central Presbyterian met on Tuesday, May 20, by Zoom and we had as guests the Confirmation Class and their mentors.

New Members: Sydney Collier, Callie Eckley, Maddie Harris and Ada Ritchie were welcomed into the membership of the church. They will be officially welcomed when we are able to meet in person. Callie Eckley will be baptized at our first face-to-face worship service.

The following actions were taken by the Session:

- Authorized Katherine Campbell to preach and lead worship for Sunday, June 7 (pre-recorded). Agreed to have Ann Aichinger take the week of June 1-7 off from the routine of church work. (It is the one year anniversary of Frank Aichinger's death.)
- Agreed for the High School Youth to be in Montreat to attend the Online Youth Conference June 7 -13. They will stay at their rental house in Montreat.
- John Dodge will be the Commissioner to the Abingdon Presbytery meeting on Thursday, June 11 (by Zoom)
- Received the report from the *What's Next Taskforce* about next steps in our life as a church family. A brief report will be included in the current Central Life
- Heard the report of the Office Administrator Search Committee and approved the hiring of Deborah Lynn Gilbert as of June 1. She will work with Patty Caldwell for three weeks as Patty prepares to retire on June 30.
- Approved to open two new bank accounts at First Bank: one for the Payroll Protection plan money and one for the Shop for Good monies.
- Authorize Online Communion for June 7, July 5, and August 2 (as needed and if still out of the • building)
- Received the Nominating Committee report and approved the call of a Congregational meeting to be held on Sunday, June 14, at 1 p.m. by Zoom for the purpose of electing elders for the Class of 2023. Invitations for that meeting will be sent out for all to attend by computer or by phone.
- Agreed to have APPLE preschool be considered to open in June, and a group will be working on the guidelines and proposed opening date.
- Called Session meeting (by Zoom) on Tuesday, May 26, at 6:30 p.m. to consider the APPLE preschool opening proposal.

Next Session Meeting will be Tuesday, June 16, at 7 p.m. by Zoom.
