Recently I was reading an article from BaptistNews.com written by Clare Johnson, a Baptist pastor in Spartanburg, SC. The article was entitled, *While Some Try to Politicize Wearing Face Masks, for Me It's a Spiritual Practice,* and I began to think about how we can bear witness to the love of Jesus by the simple act of wearing a mask. We know that there is a great debate among individuals and groups as to whether face coverings make a difference or not. But the science is showing that it truly is making a difference in the spread of the virus. But what about this might offer us guidance in growing in our relationship with God, and others and ourselves?

First, when I choose to wear a mask or face covering, it is not about me. I choose to wear a mask in public because I am concerned about you, and the strangers I encounter when in the world. I am seeking to offer to you and to others a sign of my love and care for you. By wearing a mask or face covering, I seek to offer you safety and to wish for you wellness and health. It is a demonstration of Jesus' call to care for the least of these among us and those at the greatest risk.

Second, wearing a mask or face covering means I am willing to set aside my own identity and my own personal comfort for the sake of another. It is a sign of humility. When I am ridiculed or looked at by strangers as weird and unacceptable, I know that as a Christ follower, the scorn and ridicule I bear is nothing like that of what Jesus bore for my sake and the sake of the world.

Third, I have several different masks. One is a blue disposable mask that I got in a travel kit when I went to Ecuador this winter. Another is a cloth one made for me by the ladies of Central who have been making masks, and it has purple butterflies on it. The third was given to me by a friend who was making masks and knew I liked cats, so she gave me a tiger print mask. I know that when I wear these masks, I am reminding myself of the love of people who care about me and know me. And in wearing the blue mask, I think of my incredible journey to the Galapagos Islands and the wonders I saw there. But this love I feel is more than just a human love, for I know that I am a part of a faith community and that I am blessed to have so many wonderful friends who love me and care for me. In fact, their love is a glimpse of the great love that God has for each of us. So by wearing a mask and dealing with the uncomfortable reality, I realize that in fact, this practice is surrounded with love, and I discover the love of God for me and for you.

In summary, I quote the final paragraph of Clare Johnson's article, and hope that you can ponder the practice of wearing a mask as a way to deepen your relationship with God and others. Clare Johnson writes that "I have found that choosing to wear a mask as a spiritual practice has deepened my faith and increased my commitment to my neighbors during this time of pandemic. I hope and pray for the time when protective face masks are no longer necessary. But I also hope that the lessons God is teaching through this practice remain an integral part of my life of faith."

What's Next Report:

A taskforce of Ann Aichinger, Jenna Wagner, Rob Hollo, Mike Vollmer, Linda Waldron, John Barker and Robert Campbelle met on Tuesday, May 27, by Zoom to continue the conversation about having inperson worship at Central Presbyterian.

In preparing for the in-person worship option, we ask that you are mindful about your own personal risk in attending in-person or not. This is not a required event, nor will you be looked down on for not attending. We do not want anyone to feel obligated to attend.

We are working on setting clear boundaries and yet creating a low-anxiety, comfortable experience. We all are dealing with this crisis in various ways, and so there are lots of emotions as a part of looking to worship on July 5. We are planning on having Nursery for our very youngest children.

We will need many people to help with staffing and directions on that day.

- 2 people willing to hand out **masks** for those who do not bring their own;
- 2 Greeters who are comfortable NOT shaking hands or hugging but simply to welcome people as they come to the church; these folks would also take attendance and get information from any visitors that we might have;
- 2 ushers who will help people find seats in the Sanctuary since some pews will be closed and social distancing will be practiced;
- 2 people staffing the **Communion kit table**. As we are preparing to have Communion that day, we will have a table set up in the entry area with personal Communion kits. Each Communion kit will have a cracker and small cup of grape juice. You will be invited to pick one up:
- 2 people willing to spray hand sanitizer into palms of worshippers upon entry;
- 2 people willing to help with Children's time (possibly outside time);

If you are willing and able to do one of these jobs, please call the church office (276-669-3157) to sign up.

We are still working on the details, and will have these clarified in the next Central Life as well as in a letter to every household. We are not making decisions out of urgency or panic. Instead, we see that it is important to consider the best way forward in this time of uncertainty and to be mindful of individuals involved in our church family.

We are working on establishing how to conduct worship in the sanctuary. The wearing of masks or face covering will be required of everyone attending to limit droplets of saliva being spread. We are encouraging people to consider your own safety and situation as to whether you are able to attend. Meanwhile, Central Presbyterian worship will continue to be recorded and available on the website for viewing (CentralPresBristol.org).

Please continue to pray for this group to have wisdom and to follow God's guiding as we move forward together in this time.
