Central Presbyterian Church December 16, 2020

One of the things I have not had much of during these past nine months has been time to reflect and wonder. Most of this has to do with my steep learning curve of the technology involved in living in this interesting time. Frank would have embraced all of this new technology and conquered it quickly, and well. But for me, I have to spend hours learning how to work with it, and then try to teach others to use it for meetings, gatherings, Bible studies, and for just visiting. Yet, I have learned a lot in these 9 months. Not just about technology, but about what is at the core of who we are as Christians, and as a Christian community.

There is a youth group game which illustrates what life is like in the church. The group stands in a circle, and then a ball of yarn is tossed to each person in the circle. As the yarn is tossed, each person holds onto the string and then tosses the ball to another. This continues until everyone has received the ball of yarn once. What is then created is a web. Different members of the group are then invited to tug on the string to see how the whole web moves and shifts. Then, one person is asked to release the string and we see how the whole web droops. Our web of relationships have drooped at times and have been stretched, but we somehow continue to maintain our connections with one another.

We know that worship is important in the Christian faith, but we have had to embrace new ways of gathering to worship the Lord while staying at home. Human contact is vital for our thriving as people. We have had to adapt our gatherings with each other through parking lot events and Zoom Bible studies. These 'virtual" contacts have allowed us to not only see each other, but to be with each other, and this helps to renew our relationships. We have had better Session and committee meeting attendance on Zoom because we do not have to drive anywhere; saves us time. We have learned that our families need to be the center of our Christian discipleship. The life of the church is in our relationships with God through Christ, and with one another. Though we have been separated from each other, there has been on-going care throughout our congregation. Many of you have been calling and checking in on people, dropping off meals, and writing cards and notes. I appreciate everyone's efforts in remaining connected to one another.

This Christmas will be quite different for all of us. There are more state mandates and requests to remain at home and not to mix with others during the holidays. We put up our Christmas trees and our decorations. We send cards and gifts to family and friends because we desire to continue to have those personal connections that are so crucial for us. I know that I am looking forward to those days after this virus is under control too, but for now, this Christmas is going to be different. Or is it? Maybe we are being invited into the very heart of Christmas. We still celebrate the birth of Christ into our world. We still listen and hear the angels sing and announce the Good news of a baby born in Bethlehem. Maybe we need to hear those words from the Grinch—when he realizes that having taken away all the decorations and presents and lights and trees, that in fact, "Christmas perhaps means a little bit more."

Yes, Christmas is more. It is about how God chooses to show up and move into our neighborhoods to live among us. That God dares to enter our lives and be with us, even in difficult, uncertain times of life. That God loves each of us and all of creation so much that He would give us the ultimate gift of Life and Love through his son, Jesus Christ.

May this Christmas be a time for us all to pause and realize that though Christmas IS different this year, we are still to celebrate the coming of Christ into our world, to come and bow down before the Lord, and to offer what we have.





Finance Report: 2021 Pledge Campaign...



God is calling us to continue to serve in this community, and to be a shining light on this hill. Together we can make a difference, and God is able to use our gifts to further hope, mercy, justice, and love.

Thank you to everyone who has made a commitment to financially support the work of Central Presbyterian Church in 2021. We are greatly appreciative of everyone's gifts. We also know that many of our church family are struggling with financial uncertainties and difficulties due to the pandemic, with the economic downturn, and the unknown of what 2021 holds. We hope that 2021 will be a better year for everyone, but it means that we must all seek to care for one another and continue to maintain our church family

connections. Part of how we do this is to continue our financial support to the work of the church.

Central continues to support agencies and organizations that care for the least among us. These include, but are not limited to:

- * The Session continues to provide valuable insight, leadership, and direction.
- * The backpack program continues to fill bags for hungry children.
- * Our staff members continue to keep the communications going in the church family.
- * Pastor Ann, with Robert Campbelle and Ed Updyke, record worship and make those available online.
- * Joy Briggs is providing music for the recorded worship services.
- * Josie Russell is connecting weekly with our youth and plans events, even online, for them to participate in together.
- * Lynn Gilbert and Mary Moffatt continue to keep the office and finances in order.
- * Trish James continues to work on providing refreshments for our parking lot gatherings.
- * Barbara Mann and Thais Sikora, although they are "retired" from the Parish Nurse program, continue to keep in touch with, and care for those who are ill, who are coming home from the hospital, who are in care facilities, as well as assisting our church members to make good decisions about medical care.
- * Becky Widner and the Apple staff have been able to continue with the Apple Academy for 62 preschoolers and families.
- * We have developed new ways to stay connected with each through the Wednesday evening Bible
- * studies, *RightNow* Media, the Presbyterian Women monthly gatherings, and much more.

To-date, we have received 74 commitment cards for a total of \$235,169 towards the 2021 Stewardship Campaign. We have had several new pledges, and 27 of those have met, or exceeded, the \$20 a month challenge. However, at this time, we are about \$35,000 below last year's giving, and the Session will be working on adjusting committee budgets to reflect this decrease in pledged support.

If you are still planning to make a financial commitment, and can make an end-of-the year gift, we ask that you please do so as soon as possible. Mary Moffatt, our Finance Director is available to answer any questions about your giving statement and to receive your gift. If you should have any questions about the work of the church, please contact Ann Aichinger or any of the Elders.

Even in a very strange year, the work and ministry of Central continues. We are hoping to be able to resume some of our favorite events and activities as soon as the virus has gotten under control. But until that time, we will continue to seek to work together as a church, sharing the Good News of Jesus in our community, and in our world through our commitments and our service.



Session Notes...



The Session met on Tuesday, December 14 for their monthly stated meeting.

- * Each person was asked to share what he or she is watching and waiting for in this Christmas season.
- Pastor Ann shared how she has been involved in the life of the church, community and Abingdon Presbytery. She reminded everyone about the Service of Lessons and Carols sponsored by Abingdon Presbytery on Sunday, December 20 at 4 p.m. by Zoom. Central will be one of the participating churches.
- * Each committee chair was invited to share what has been going on in their work. The main business of the meeting was in looking at the 2020 actual giving, and then at the 2021 proposed budget in light of the 2021 pledges received. Each Committee is asked to revisit their budget and return to the 2020 budget numbers or to find other areas to trim.
- * The Session approved the pastor's housing resolution.
- * A gift from the Session, honoring Ann Aichinger, will be given to the charity of Ann's choosing.
- * There are some tools from the **Carpenter's for Christ** trailer that are for sale in the Session room. These include a circular saw, a table saw, and other items. If you are interested, please speak with David White about what is available, and for pricing information.
- * John Barker will be attending the January meeting of Abingdon Presbytery on January 14, 2021 by Zoom. The next Session meeting will be on Tuesday, January 19, 2021 at 7:00 p.m. by Zoom.

Reminder to all donors:

The general rule is that a contribution is effective when delivered. A check deposited in the church offering in January of 2021 cannot be deducted in 2020, even if it is backdated to 2020. One exception - checks that are mailed and postmarked in 2020 are deductible in 2020, even if they are not received until 2021. We hope that this will be helpful to you.

Do not to file your federal income tax return before you have received your contribution summary from the church. Donors may not be able to deduct individual contributions of \$250 or more if they file a tax return before receiving a qualified contribution receipt from their church.


Miniature Nativities
