If a sabbatical is not a

vacation, then what is it?

Dear Church Family,

A few weeks ago we had the session's Annual Report, together with the Gifts Inventory. If you have not filled out the inventory and returned it to the office, we would greatly appreciate it if you did. That same Sunday my sermon was on work, in which we noted that having good work was a part of life before sin ever entered the picture (see Genesis 2:15). Having meaningful work which is when our work is connected to God's work was a part of being in Paradise. While most things in life are best done in moderation, work seems to be one of the few things that even having a great deal of it is still good for us. When God created everything at the Beginning, the pattern was "work-work-work-work-work There is something about having -work-rest." meaningful work that is inherent to human dignity. Humankind – and nothing else that God created – was given the gift of work.

And, like any gift, it is possible to misuse it. Working so

little due to laziness or a sense of entitlement so that we burden others, or, working so much that our family relationships suffer due to our absence are to ways to abuse this gift. It is a sacred balance.

One of the ways to restore this work-rest balance is to take pleasure in God's gift of the Sabbath (see Mark 2:27). "Sabbath" literally means "to cease." This can take a number of forms in the Bible, and it is the basis for my upcoming sabbatical (i.e. June-July-August). This is similar to the pattern in the 7 Day Creation narrative, i.e. after seven years of work comes a season of rest. So, what exactly is a sabbatical? Is it simply an extended vacation? I want to be very clear on this. The answer is: No. It is not an extended vacation. So what then is it?

It is a time to "cease" (or be released from) the regular demands of life in order to grow. It is a time to be very intentional: to step back, to reflect, to pray, to be still and to do it all over again and again. I am working with a spiritual director and will bookend my sabbatical with solitary retreats. He and I are will work on one or two spiritual themes and then create a plan to specifically listen to what the Lord would say to those areas. The whole sabbatical has both a structure and great intentionality. To treat it purely as vacation would make a great waste of an incredible opportunity to deepen my life of discipleship. It is a time of growth and strengthening and refreshment. Of course, "resting" is part of the mix. There will be rest, opportunities to do something new, and a vacation with the family. Hopefully, at the end of the sabbatical, life will be characterized by spiritual growth, a renewed sense of living out God's call, and a deeper closeness with the Lord. A general framework for a sabbatical may be summarized something like this: release, rest, reflect and refocus.

Heath Burchett, who has preached here a number of times, and who was on staff at our fellow ECO church Bethel in Cornelius has agreed both to preach regularly in my absence and to be in the office one day a week to have a steady pastoral presence and to run staff meetings. The elders will rotate being on call, and they may elect their own moderator, as well as elect someone to administer the sacraments while I am away. It is my hope that everything will be as smooth as possible since summer is the best time in the life of the congregation to be away. I will miss you. And I

> hope that my sabbatical will not be an encouragement to drift away. Many times when a congregation is between pastors or the pastor is away, it can be a very unifying time because

everyone recognizes that this is an ideal time to come together to keep life vibrant. The congregation is so much richer than simply one person or pastor. You have Jesus. He is more than enough.



Here are recipes from the two diet plans that do not make you feel deprived and are easy to make:

Dr. Hyman's Black Bean Soup

(The Daniel Plan Detox)

- 1 tbsp extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 tbsp garlic
- 1 small onion, diced
- 1 tbsp cumin
- 2 (15 ounce) cans black beans
- 2 cups water or vegetable stock
- 1 bav leaf

1 1/2 tbsp wheat-free tamari (or soy sauce) 1 tbsp lemon juice

Chopped fresh cilantro for garnish.

Heat the olive oil over medium heat in a soup pot. cool slightly. Place crushed walnuts on a plate. Add the garlic and onions, and cook until the onions Thread banana onto skewer or popsicle stick. Dip are translucent. Add the cumin, and sautéa few half of banana into melted chocolate and roll more minutes. Add the canned beans, including carefully into crushed walnuts. The session met on December 11, January 8, and February 12. Here are combined highlights of the three meetings:


- Approved the 2019 budget.
