The Dinner Table

The Dinner Table...what's that?

It's a new ministry proposal with the goal of feeding our hungry neighbors here in Windom.

Just a few months ago (*in July*) we did a Wednesday night study called **You**Were Made to Make a Difference. We watched video clips, studied scripture and asked the question, "What needs are there right here in Windom that God might use us to meet?"



As we discussed and prayed in small groups a number of needs became apparent. The *Made to Make a Difference* study encouraged us to focus on one goal—in order to keep it realistic and possible to follow through. We took a vote, and from several very obvious, worthy needs in our community, the idea of feeding our neighbors rose to the top.

Along with food, we agreed a deeper goal is to feed people spiritually, offering them the love of Christ and ways to respond to that love and become followers of Jesus.

So what's next? A few folks from the study have continued to dream, plan and look ahead. We have met with the Rethink Team to discuss how it might fit into our church's larger mission (and there are some exciting ideas here for using The Dinner Table as a springboard for more outreach and church growth!). We have presented it to our Missions Team, and they are also on board with the idea.

Then we applied for a \$1,000 grant from the Minnesota Conference as seed money. We were one of 27 churches (out of 46 who applied) that received the grant!

We soon plan to have a conversation with folks from Pierre, SD, who have a similar ministry there called *The Banquet* (although it's not affiliated with The Banquet in Sioux Falls). We want to get their input and learn from their experience as we go forward. Hopefully they can help us start well and avoid unforeseen roadblocks.

Our vision is to find a place in or near downtown Windom to serve a meal once a week. We also plan to invite other churches, businesses and organizations to take turns serving a weekly meal. I have already shared this vision with the Ministerial Association, so they know we would like other churches to share in this ministry.

If this is something that excites you and grabs your heart, please get involved! Talk to me, or to Kathy Jo or to Terri Jones. Let us know you'd like to be involved in our conversations and planning! Ask us lots of questions! We want all interested persons to get involved.

Most of all we want to invite our hungry neighbors to *The Dinner Table*. And our prayer is that they will become closer neighbors, and we can share the love of Christ with them over a meal, but also through a new friendship as we break bread together.

The Sunday School classes are gearing up for a mission project. Operation Christmas Child. This is a unique project of Samaritan's Purse that delivers gift-filled shoe boxes to hurting children around the world. This simple hands-on mission project gives our entire church family, especially children, a tangible way to demonstrate the true meaning of Christmas—God's gift of His Son.

There is a drop off box in the sign -up area of the church lobby if you would like to donate items

to be packed by Sunday school children. The age groups for giving are 2-4, 5-9, and 10-14. Items are needed for both boys and girls. Most things are accepted but the following items are not: Used or damaged items; warrelated items; chocolate or food; out of date candy; fruit rolls or other fruit snacks; drink mixes (powdered or liquid); liquids or lotions: medications or vitamins: breakable items such as snow globes or glass containers; aerosol cans. Please bring your items to church prior to

November 11th. There is also a cost of \$9.00/box to ship these gifts. If you would like to help with this cost, please make your check payable to the church with Operation Christmas Child in the memo line. These boxes also need your prayers. 30 Days -30 Ways To Be the Neighbor




Hope 4 Kids Child Sponsorship

How Can You Help Your Local Neighbors?

- 2. Talk about your "deposits" as a family over meals—what other blessings are you grateful for? Who do you know who may not have some of these blessings listed and how could you help them?
- 3. At the end of the month, bring your collection back to church/group or to your local LSS Senior Nutrition meal site. All contributions will support your local community's meal program.

For the average household, your "deposits" may add up to \$15.

For your family, this may be an order of pizza or half a tank of gas. \$15 for our program will purchase 5 blizzard meals for an older adult or \$15 will buy 4 meals for someone who cannot afford to contribute for their meals.

Minnesota Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church

CONFERENCE CONNECTIONS

All United Methodist churches are connected through shared mission and ministry and united in their efforts to grow in love of God and neighbor, reach new people, and heal a broken world. Check out these news tidbits from the Minnesota Annual Conference, which serves all 360 United Methodist churches in the state.

- **Bishop Ough on sexual assault and abuse:** On Thursday, Sept. 27, the nation was riveted by Dr, Christine Blasey Ford's testimony to the Senate Judiciary Committee in the Judge Kavanaugh confirmation hearings. "No matter what one's political position is regarding Judge Kavanaugh's nomination to become a Supreme Court justice, we, as followers of Jesus, can no longer remain silent about the sin of sexual assault and abuse or tolerate 'boys will be boys' excuses," said Bishop Bruce R. Ough. He urged all who seek to follow Jesus to create safe space for those who have been sexually harassed, assaulted, or abused; listen with compassion and honor the stories; seek training on ministering to survivors of sexual abuse and assault; and discover local referral and support services for survivors.
- 'Way Forward' resources: In February, clergy and lay delegates from around the world will gather in St. Louis, Missouri to receive and act on a report from the Commission on a Way Forward, a 32-member group that has spent two years exploring how The United Methodist Church might move forward as a denomination around the divisive topic of human sexuality. There are a variety of excellent resources that can be used individually, with a small group, or with your congregation in preparation for that gathering. September, ground was broken on a new Tabernacle at Koronis Ministries Camp and Retreat Center in Paynesville. The new Tabernacle, which will be ready to welcome guests by spring 2019, will be a multi-level, multi-use, year-round meeting and worship space that has state-of-the-art technology, modern amenities, and full accessibility. So far, nearly \$1.7 million has been committed to the \$2 million project. A capital campaign is underway to raise the remaining funds. "As we break ground, we are affirming we are still in the business of building on the sure foundation, which is Jesus Christ," said Bishop Bruce R. Ough.

BRIGHT SPOT IN OUR MIDST

Aitkin UMC welcomes the stranger at the door: On a cold day last December, Rev. Dawn Houser opened the doors of her church—Aitkin UMC—to a homeless man and helped him secure a place to stay for the night. He came to worship the next morning and was greeted with radical hospitality and genuine acceptance by the rest of the congregation. The next time the man was in need of a place to stay. Houser invited him to stay at the church. While there, he completed a variety of small repairs and the church hired him to do some painting. The man spent seven weeks living at the church and under the care of the congregation. Some members of the church who own a car dealership eventually gave him a job, and the congregation helped him get set up in an apartment. The man continues to be involved with the congregation and has experienced the love of Jesus through many people. He's developed his own relationship with God. And he gave Aitkin UMC the opportunity to live out the commandment to love your neighbor as yourself. Thanks be to God!

4 stories of lives changed in our midst

As the Minnesota Conference focuses on growing in love of God and neighbor, reaching new people, and healing a broken world, all Minnesota United Methodist churches are tracking and submitting metrics on a weekly basis that help us pay attention to the impact we're making in these areas. In addition to tracking worship attendance and faith professions, each church is also asked to provide periodic stories of life transformation. In many cases, these stories are powerful examples of the ways in which churches are fulfilling the Great Commission and serving as beacons of love and compassion in their communities. Here are four inspiring stories that have been shared in the

Le Sueur UMC: Embracing God's love

Lisa, James, and their two children joined Le Sueur UMC in 2016 after 12-year-old Calvin repeatedly asked to attend services. Although Lisa and James did not grow up in religious families, they agreed that if their kids wanted to join a church, they were not going to stop them. After visiting a few churches, they walked into Le Sueur UMC and knew they were done searching. They made good friends, got involved, and brought their kids to "Jesus and Me" (JAM), a program for youth. Lisa was eventually invited to volunteer at JAM and embraced the opportunity. "I love learning about Jesus during JAM just as much as the kids do," she said. "It was odd for me to be asked because I was brand new and had no relationship with Jesus." Then came the fire. Last fall, a fire damaged the family's home, forcing them to move to temporary housing and adjust to a new life. "That fire changed me," said Lisa. "In the past, before I had a church family, I would have seen it as validation that I was worthless." The fire was the first tragedy she encountered without feeling like being angry with God. "Before becoming Methodist, I would have said, 'I don't think I'm part of God's plan," she said. "Now, due to the fire and the response from the church, I do feel like I'm part of God's story—even if I'm not sure how!" Lisa said she used to have a love/hate relationship with God. "I now see that God never hated me—He's always loved me," she explained. "I think the hate was me hating me, as if I didn't deserve it. Now I see that God is there for everyone, and that includes me!...My husband says I'm a completely different person now. I'm much happier."

Aldersgate UMC (St. Louis Park): Finding a church home

An 80-year-old man and his wife started to attend Aldersgate UMC regularly after returning from Arizona for the season and being invited by their daughter (a new member of the church). They had nominally belonged to a large Lutheran church in town but rarely attended. But they began to enjoy the homey, welcoming, personable vibe at Aldersgate and started coming regularly. During that time, the man's wife started to experience some odd health problems, which they recently learned were due to a rapid form of ALS. Rev. Paul Baudhuin met with them after the diagnosis, and they expressed their gratitude for Aldersgate coming into their lives because they couldn't imagine navigating this season without what they've been experiencing through the church. The man said that since coming to the church, and even before the diagnosis, a spirituality awakened in both of them that has been their strength throughout the hard days. He spoke specifically of a series the church did on the Holy Spirit (called "Just Breathe"), and some of the ideas and practices that came out of it helped them navigate their latest challenges, both physically and spiritually. While churches often focus on reaching young people, we must remember that a community of faith is crucial for people of all ages. Many older people have lost touch with their faith communities but are in seasons in which they desperately need one. Furthermore, we must not limit our older members' capacity for change and revival. The human spirit is ever malleable to the hand of the Holy Spirit. We are never too old to have our faith revived.

First UMC (Redwood Falls): After-school kids club

The church started an after-school kids club with the help of a micro grant from the Minnesota Conference and in May completed its second year of this ministry. In 2016-2017, four children from the elementary school across the street attended. During the last school year, 13 participated. Half of the students are not involved with any other church. This weekly ministry intentionally nurtures Christian faith through a variety of engaging activities. At the end of the second year, the kids wrote thank you notes to the congregation, and some said that they hoped the ministry would continue. A note from a boy named Dylan was especially touching: "Thank you for letting us learn about God."

North Summit Church (Blaine): 16 baptized

In June, 16 people of all ages were baptized and three additional people gave their life to Christ at North Summit Church, a new church start that meets inside of Blaine UMC. The church, which uses the tagline "daring to be different," aims to be a community of loving, real people who are dedicated to "climbing toward Christ." The church attracts people immersed in the local music and arts scene—but also individuals who have been through divorce, adultery, addiction, homelessness, and other painful experiences. 
