

Children's Sermon

Two of our values and priorities at FPC are for our worship services to honor and glorify God to the very best of our abilities and for our children to be ministered to in the most effective ways possible.

From out of both of these priorities our staff, children's ministry, worship committee and our session have been wrestling with the question: "What are the best ways for our children to discover, experience and grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ?"

The following are some of the concerns that we have addressed recently which Pastor John spoke about during our congregational meeting in January.

- It is nice for the Pastor to have a connection with the young ones in the congregation, but two minutes up in front of the sanctuary is not the place to establish or nurture a real connection. What we hope is that Pastor John can connect with our children at King's Kids, VBS, or special activities like bowling or hiking. There will be a lot of new activities happening for the children following the summer school break... stay tuned.
- The children's sermon is either about the sermon topic for worship or it is about the lesson the children will learn in Children's Church. The topic from Children's Church would make the most sense for our kids, but would not flow with the rest of our worship service. The sermon theme would not be best for the children as it doesn't support what they are going to hear in Children's Church.
- While some of the children are comfortable up front, many others are not. Some parents felt it was quite challenging to have their children involved and interested.
- Children's sermons end up putting kids "on display" while we enjoy how cute they are and how they "say the darndest things." We enjoy seeing and hearing them, but is this the purpose and a reason to keep having them come up front?
- Teaching to such a diverse range of ages is difficult. Some of the children who come forward for the Children's Sermon are two years old and some are as old as fifth grade. The "sermon" is not as helpful (for the children's education) as the more extensive and age-appropriate lesson downstairs in Children's Church.
- We as adults receive a sermon that is appropriate in length and content. We want the very same to be true for our children in Children's Church.
- If we really want to enjoy the children, you could volunteer at VBS (like so many of you did!), Sunday school or the upcoming King's Kids. Get to know the kids and connect with them as they develop a relationship with their Savior and become young disciples.

We will continue to involve our children in the worship service through leading in prayer, read or memorize Scripture, present a song, take communion and enjoy fellowship with the church family.

We want to reiterate that our Children's Ministry will continue to find ways to keep our kids involved in the worship service while making sure that Children's Church provides fun, engaging classes that include Bible-based lessons, crafts, games, laughter and love. Our purpose is to help children discover Christ and develop a relationship with Him.

Why I love America: By Grace Preedy Barnes

I was born into an immigrant family; English father, American mother. My grandparents and parents were missionaries to China. My parents grew up in China separately and later in life went back to China as missionaries, met and married.

We moved 31 times before I was three. That same year our family traveled by boat to spend Christmas in the US and England on a furlough. The first boat stop was in Manila on Pearl Harbor Day. The crew got scared and dumped us and our luggage on the dock and we were stranded for three years.

God protected us in amazing ways during WWII. Finally release came to our family and we traveled to the US and England and back to China. We children went to British boarding school till the Communists took over China. All missionaries were kicked out. I was 12. Our family went to England, but our father was held back by the Communists for three years. After further British boarding school education, our mother and we four kids traveled to the US and settled in California. I went right into a Christian high school.

Father was released and eventually joined us. Our parents decided that is was best for us to live in the US. And in my senior year, I wrote in my Bible, "Here I am, send me!" Wow! I sure didn't know what that would mean for my future. By that time I had traveled and moved so much and had lived in five homelands. I felt I didn't really belong anywhere.

Here are a few of the amazing opportunities I have had since living and working in the US.

- 1) A college education focused on youth which led to working with Young Life.
- 2) Continued higher education, becoming a professor and traveling to 50 countries over 25 years, and
- 3) The calling to God's Kingdom work with churches and other ministries across the country.

I now believe I belong everywhere! America is beautiful to me. I believe we are all blessed!

Sunshine & Sleep

How did you spend summer solstice: all 15 hrs. and 16 min. of it? My guess is probably not by sleeping, after all, who wants to sleep away all that sunshine! But sleep remains one of the important building blocks of a healthy lifestyle and much research has been done on why that is so. According to researchers at Duke University, sleeplessness takes a particularly hard toll on women. They exhibit greater psychological stress, depression, hostility and anger. And in a study of 71,000 female nurses that slept five hours or less per night, they were found to be 45% more likely to have heart problems while those that slept six hours had just a 20% risk.

So are you getting enough sleep? Do you...

- Wake up tired in the morning?
 - Need a nap in the afternoon?
 - Fall asleep watching TV?
 - Have frequent small accidents at home or large ones on the road?
 - Have trouble focusing on the job?
 - Find yourself sleepy after lunch?
 - Have trouble figuring the correct change from a purchase?
 - Feel irritable or depressed most of the time?
 - Feel like you're not getting anything done?
 - Drink alcohol to get to sleep?
 - Drink several cups of coffee or energy drinks to stay awake?
 - Have difficulty falling asleep or staying asleep?
- If you answered yes to more

than three of these questions, you may not be getting the kind of sleep you need to support good health.

Researchers are only beginning to understand how poor sleep affects our body. For example, too little sleep can cause weight gain. Researchers at England's Warwick School of Medicine who studied 28,000 adults and 15,000 children found that not getting enough sleep almost doubled the risk of obesity even in children as young as five!

Not enough sleep can also take a toll on one's immune system and in fact, getting fewer than six hours of sleep can raise your risk of viral infection by 50%! At the height of flu season, this can be especially important.

Lack of sleep can raise your blood levels of inflammatory markers such as CRP, a substance that increases the risk of cardiovascular disease. But this chronic inflammation can have other negative effects such as a precursor to cancer, heart attack, stroke and premature aging.

On a positive note, however, we can take steps to improve our sleep. For example, the half-life of caffeine is six hours. It lingers in your body all day so limiting caffeine to the morning hours may be helpful.




What Falls from the Sky: How I Disconnected From the Internet and Reconnected With the God Who Made the Clouds By: Esther Emery

Session Meeting Summary June 14, 2018

Pastor John opened the regular meeting of session with prayer. Elders joined him in reading the current memory verse, Romans 13:15. Dave Pollard shared his faith story. The elders discussed “Enlarge Your Soul Through Grief and Loss,” chapter 5 of Emotionally Healthy Spirituality with personal experiences of growing in times of grief or loss.

The following items were brought before Session for information and/or action:

Training with Lt. Rob Reynolds will occur either July 8th or 15th at 11:00 a.m.

Discussions are ongoing with a graphic artist concerning the updated FPC logo.

There will be a review of the decision to suspend the children’s sermon at the July Session meeting.

The following were recommended as new covenant partners: C. J. Riley, Robert and Angela Clements, Belinda Scalas, Brandy Crockett, Ethan DuBois. They will be received by the congregation on June 17th. C.J. Riley will be baptized.

New elders and deacons will be installed on July 1st.

Elder/deacon training will be held July 14th, 9:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m.

To accommodate participation in Third Thursday downtown in the summer months, Session meetings have been changed to July 12th and August 23rd.

John will be on vacation July 23-August 5.

John will be participating in continuing education August 7-12.

A second young adult gathering will be on July 16th 4:30-6:30. First one was very successful.

John and elders expressed thanks to outgoing elders Don and Keith for their service on Session.

Incoming elder Belinda Scalas will be the chair of the personnel committee.

FPC was named as the beneficiary

of a life insurance policy from Dorothy Proctor. This generous gift of \$63,000 will be distributed in monthly payments over 72 months. It was recommended that this gift be treated as a memorial and that discussion be held at the July Session meeting of ways to use it.

Priority projects for physical resources include: 1) bathroom remodels, 2) lighting upfront, 3) kitchen updates, 4) sanctuary cooling.

There is a need to have a knowledgeable committee discussing any kitchen remodel.

There will be a church work party June 23.

Discussions are being held concerning the necessity for an AED unit in the church and appropriate training.

Westminster Church in Medford is planting a church in Ashland and asking other churches to partner with them.

Jonna Reeder will be here September (23-24).

Worship committee is recommending purchase of a portable baptistry, in order to have baptism by immersion for those who desire that. Issues of weight and storage are being investigated.

A potential consultant has been contacted to ensure FPC updated employee handbook is aligned with current Oregon Employment Statutes.

Reports were given by these committees and minutes of their meetings are available upon request: Finance, Physical Resources, Worship, Missions, and Personnel.

A recommendation was made for offering a position to a candidate for youth director, pending acceptable background and reference check and timeline for transition into the position.

The next regular meeting is Thursday, July 12th at 6:45 pm. Meetings are open. If there are items a person would like Session to address, please contact an elder in the week prior.
