"Christmas: A Time of Remembering, Celebrating, and Investing"

Good morning, Wesley family. Can you believe that Christmas is only five days away? Unbelievable! The familiar Christmas story is old, however every year we attempt to extract some fresh water from this old well. The story is retold annually with the intent to gain some new insight into the significance of Jesus' birth. We are familiar with John 3:16 which says, "For God so loved the world that He sent His only begotten Son that whosoever would believe in Him would not perish but have everlasting life." It is one of the greatest scriptures of all time.

Today marks the 4th and final Sunday of the Advent season. During the Advent season, we remember with extreme intentionality the reason why Jesus was sent to our world – to serve and to save. Our worship and our work to make disciples should intensify during this holy season as we remember not just the "who" of Jesus but also His "why?" I believe it was Mark Twain who said that "the two most important days in your life are the day you were born and the day you figure out why you were born." Therefore, Christmas is a holy-day when we celebrate the "why" of Jesus. Jesus came to save us from the effects of sin, the efforts of Satan, and the evils of systems of oppression. Jesus came to save us from going to hell, which is separation from God. Why catch hell on earth and then die and go to hell? That's just too much hell. Jesus came to restore our relationships to our Heavenly Father and humanity. That's a cause for remembering and celebrating.

We must remember that He was nurtured in a woman's womb. We must remember He was born of an unwed teenage African-Jewish girl named Mary. Then we must celebrate the birth of this baby boy who would grow up to become the Savior of the world. And we celebrate the birth of this baby boy who would grow up and become the Jesus of history and the Christ of faith. There is another angle to the Christmas story we must highlight as well.

When one reads the Christmas story in the gospels, one realizes that Jesus didn't raise himself. He was a product of his community, his family, his faith, his heritage, his history, the Temple, and his synagogue (i.e., his community of faith). Jesus was nurtured by this holistic village and I argue that without that nurturing He would not have become the Son of God nor the Savior we know him to be.

I am suggesting that one of the powerful messages of the all- too-familiar Christmas story is that it reminds the church community of how important it is to invest in children. The birth narratives of the Christ child demand a response for the Black Church in the 21st century by posing the question, "What are we doing to protect, guide, nurture, teach, lead, uplift, feed, clothe, house, and educate its children?" To bring it home, how will this Advent/Christmas season change our mindset at Wesley UMC when it comes to reaching out to children and making them a high priority? The baby Jesus is the focus during this season and it would be a great thing if that would serve as a catalyst for our great church to start focusing on the babies and teens in our community. 

The Holidays, Reflections and Setting Future Goals

The holiday season is not only about family and friends coming together or giving thanks, but it is also about reflection. Research from Harvard Business School shows you learn most from your experiences when you take time to reflect. Further research shows that when you purposely make an effort to synthesize, extract and communicate the key lessons taught by experience, the experience itself becomes more productive and you feel more confident in our ability to do better next time.

Before the end of the year, take some time to reflect on the following questions:

What went well this year? What did not go so well this year? How could I have done it differently?

Once you have determined what can be done differently, think about setting future goals. By setting goals you are able to measure your future success. It also helps you to stay on track when things get crazy (and they will!) Start by asking yourself, "What is it that I really want to achieve?" Next, make sure that you are ready to commit to achieving your goal(s). If you are ready, then set your goals!

When setting your long and short-term goal(s), make sure they are S.M.A.R.T.

S=Specific Ask yourself the who, what, where, when and why about your goal(s)

M=Measurable Ask yourself, how will I know if I am making progress

A=Achievable Ask yourself, how important is this goal(s) and how attainable is it R=Realistic Ask yourself, is the goal(s) reachable given the time and resources

T=Timely Ask yourself, when do I want to achieve this goal

Setting goals may be difficult, but if you follow the directions above and take some small steps toward them, it will be just a matter of time before you achieve them.

Chicago Episcopal Diocese Elects First Black Woman as Bishop

A Washington D.C. priest made history in Chicago last Saturday, becoming the first Black person and the first woman ever elected bishop of the city's local arm of the Episcopal Church. The Rev. Canon Paula E. Clark was unanimously selected among four candidates on the fourth ballot of a virtual convention to take the helm of the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago, church leaders said.

"We Episcopalians are strong people who can model for the rest of this country and the world what it looks like to walk the way of love," Clark said. "God is calling us to a new day and a new way of being." Clark will be consecrated April 24, succeeding Bishop Jeffrey D. Lee, who is retiring Dec. 31. She comes to Chicago from the Episcopal Diocese of Washington, where she serves as canon to the ordinary and chief of staff to the bishop.

Clark received her undergraduate degree from Brown University and a master's degree in public policy from the University of California at Berkeley. Before studying at the Virginia Theological Seminary, she was a public information officer for the Washington mayor. Clark, who has focused on clergy development and multicultural and justice issues, describes herself as "the proud matriarch of [a] blended family of five adult children and seven grandchildren."

The Chicago Episcopal Diocese includes 122 congregations with a total of more than 31,000 members across northern, central and southwestern Illinois.

Little Known Black History Fact

Bishop Richard Allen



Bishop Richard Allen, the founder of the A.M.E. Church, was a hero to many and a bust erected in his honor in 1876 is thought to be first of its kind created by and for African-Americans. The monument was unveiled in Philadelphia's Fairmount Park during the Centennial International Exposition of 1876, the first official "World's Fair."

Allen was born into slavery on February 14, 1760, and though details of his place of birth have been heavily debated, some saying Delaware is his birth state. After hearing a white Methodist preacher rail against slavery, Allen converted to Methodism at 17, and was later able to buy his freedom for \$2,000 to relocate to Philadelphia.

In 1799, Allen became the first Black ordained minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and in 1816, with the help of other Black Methodist churches, founded the African Methodist Episcopal church. Bishop Allen was a vocal opponent of slavery who inspired enslaved and free Black people who shared his passion to see all people free.

The bust of Allen was on display at the exposition but later ended up in the hands of Wilberforce University in Ohio into where it sat, neglected and in storage. In 2010, Wilberforce University loaned the bust out for a ceremony marking Allen's 250th birthday at the First District A.M.E. Church headquarters.

Chuck Harrison passed on November 29. He was 87.
