### "The Mission of the Church is to Make Disciples"

"Nazareth! Can anything good come from there?" Nathanael asked. "Come and see," said Philip (John 1:46).

It was Dietrich Bonhoeffer who said that "salvation is free but discipleship is costly." Mr. Bonhoeffer was intrigued by what he called the "cost of discipleship". In fact, he was so intrigued by it that he penned a book with the same title. In the book, he argues that modern-day Christians prefer a sanitized version of Christianity that allows them to do anything they want without being asked to submit or sacrifice for the sake of the gospel. He argues that modern-day Christians want 'cheap grace.' To him, cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance, baptism without church discipline, communion without confession. Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, and grace without Jesus the Christ." To follow Jesus is a costly endeavor. And I don't mean cost as in money. I mean "costly" as in it will cost you something like your time and talents, your energy and focus. Jesus gave His life to give birth to the church. The least we could do is to continue His work of building it up.

Since we are disciples of Jesus and therefore followers of Jesus it behooves us to truly follow Him. Bible readers recognize that Jesus had a mission to save those who He considered 'lost' because their connection to God had been severed. In Luke chapter 15 we see His theology of the lost unfold. When He is criticized for sharing table fellowship with known sinners such as tax collectors and people who could or did not adhere to the Mosaic Law, he tells three parables in chapter 15. And all of the parables have the same message: Heaven rejoices and has a party when one sinner reconnects with God. Evangelism is a rewarding yet costly endeavor. One we must engage in if we are going to be a church that makes disciples out of unbelievers and unchurched people.

According to Sam Chan, author of <u>Evangelism in a Skeptical World</u>, "the essence of evangelism is the message that Jesus Christ is Lord. Evangelism is our human effort of proclaiming this message—which necessarily involves using our human communication, language, idioms, metaphors, stories, experiences, personality, emotions, context, culture, located-ness—and trusting and praying that God, in His sovereign will, will supernaturally use our human and natural means to effect his divine purposes."

Evangelism is a rewarding yet costly endeavor. It will inconvenience you. It will move you out of your comfort zone. It will cause you to do things you never thought you would do. It will cause you to express your faith. It will cause you to share your story of how God saved you. It will cause you to be transparent in order to share your testimony with coworkers, friends, and family. It will cause you to face rejection by those who don't have time to hear what you have to say. In February, we will creatively come up with ways to fulfill our mission to make disciples by focusing on the ministry, message, and methods of Jesus to seek and save the lost. Believe it or not, Jesus is not supposed to be a secret. Please read Matthew 28:18-20. Have a great week.

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### Today's Speaker

A native of Chicago, Illinois, **Reverend Dr. John E. Jackson, Sr.** received his Bachelor of Science and Master of Divinity degrees from Loyola University and McCormick Theological Seminary, respectively, in Chicago.

Under the leadership of the Reverend Dr. Jeremiah A. Wright, Jr., Reverend Jackson served as the Associate Pastor to Men's Ministries and the Pre-Marital Counseling Program at the dynamic Trinity United Church of Christ (TUCC).

In this capacity, Reverend Dr. Jackson not only provided pastoral leadership to the various Men's ministries of Trinity UCC, but he also facilitated a weekly Men's Bible Class and organized the quarterly Men's Worship Service. Reverend Jackson also developed the Annual Men's Prayer Breakfast into an Annual Men's Conference, providing opportunities for workshops, lectures, and worship to over 500 brothers-in-Christ each year.

In 2004, Reverend Dr. John E. Jackson, Sr. was called to serve as Senior Pastor of The Trinity United Church of Christ in Gary, IN. Since its first worship service the second Sunday in October 2004, Trinity UCC-Gary has been consistently growing. In order to accommodate the ever-expanding ministries, Trinity UCC-Gary completed construction of their new sanctuary for worship, and held their first worship service in the new edifice on October 5, 2008. It is located at 1276 West 20<sup>th</sup> Avenue in the City of Gary.

The motto of Trinity UCC-Gary is "We are not just another church but we are a culturally conscious Christ centered church committed to the community!" We are "Unashamedly Black and Unapologetically Christian."

In May of 2014 Pastor Jackson earned the Doctor of Ministry degree from United Theological Seminary, Dayton, OH.

Reverend Dr. John E. Jackson, Sr. shares his life with his wife the former Janiece N. Barney, their three adult children, and five grandchildren.

## I Can Still Hear Father Pfleger, No Matter How Silent Chicago Now Seems by John Fountain



Silence. Hear the silence, the sound of nothingness, crashing like waves upon this star-kissed city's shore in the face of injustice and poverty that roar. Silence deafening amid burgeoning malevolence, merciless greed that leaves Black lives scattered, Black lives shattered. Listless in the bitter night cold. Frozen in drifting now. Souls frostbitten by hatred so cold, so bold. Old schemes in "The White City," where Black dreams remain elusive, privilege exclusive. And voices that challenge the status quo, so few and far between that silence now screams! But I can still hear Pfleger, Father Pfleger, cryin' in the wilderness of dreams. Defyin' cataclysmic schemes. No matter how silent Chicago now seems — without him.

Silence. Feel the void, a familiar oppressive noise, rising violently. Capsizing, sinking beneath relentless stormy seas. Fragile new hopes, old dreams. Gasping amid Silence that drowns cries that abound. Of those who die with the mucus of poverty dripping from their lonely eyes. The deafening sound of piercing lies that soar miles high toward forbidden, powder blue skies with invisible glass ceilings. Repressed feelings and PTSD in this American city of Du Sable — where the Negro still is not free. Who is unafraid to speak for me? To fight for we? For us, in frequencies decipherable by even the least of these. But reviled by powers that be.

A voice unrelenting. Uncompromised. And yet despised. "The Enemy" to them who lie. But Champion in our brown eyes for decades now, unto this hour: Pfleger. Father Pfleger. No. 1 Instigator. No. 1 Agitator. Chief Drum Major for Justice both here and beyond. A city I find most fond of silence. Silence. O, great city now absent of that rolling thunder that cries aloud, "Justice!" even when it just is just us for whom justice is still denied. O, city that does not hear our cries: Silence!

This much is plain: Pfleger, Father Pfleger, has marched into the fiery hell of city streets. Waged a holy war for the least of these. Did not abandon ship in stormy seas. Sought not politicians or preachers to please. Cried aloud and spared not in the face of hate. That he might help alter this city's fate. Declaring with crystal clear clarity in the key of Charity, the way things are, but the way things ought to be. His light shining. Redefining "church." Bringing healing to hurt. Not a savior. But a man who has lifted his voice for a righteous plan. Stood as a good shepherd in defense of lambs when so many so-called leaders didn't give a damn. Silence! Except I still hear Pfleger, Father Pfleger. And the witness of his light, after all these years, compels me now and here, loud and clear, to say something: To hell with Silence!

### **Little Known Black History Fact**

### **Rev. Henry Highland Garnet**

**Rev. Henry Highland Garnet** made history as the first Black minister to address the U.S. House of Representatives in 1865, but another pivotal moment in his life took place this week in 1843. Garnet's famous speech "Call to Rebellion" rallied slaves to rise up against their masters and was widely criticized by other abolitionists for being too radical.

Garnet was born December 23, 1815 in New Market, Md. The family escaped slavery and settled in New York where Garnet attended school and joined the surging abolitionist movement. He became a Presbyterian minister in New York starting in 1842.

On August, 21, 1843, Garnet addressed the National Negro Convention with the speech, demanding that the enslaved pool their resources and snatch back their freedom. The speech was denounced by attendees of the convention because of its radicalism, including by Garnet's colleague, Frederick Douglass. Douglass and other abolitionists felt that Garnet's fiery speech would stoke the fears of whites and upend their non-violent efforts.

"Brethren, it is as wrong for your lordly oppressors to keep you in slavery as it was for the man thief to steal our ancestors from the coast of Africa. You should therefore now use the same manner of resistance, as would have been just in our ancestors when the bloody foot-prints of the first remorseless soul-thief was placed upon the shores of our fatherland. The humblest peasant is as free in the sight of God as the proudest monarch that ever swayed a sceptre," Garnet said in part of his address.

Garnet later traveled to Europe in 1850 and worked in the country as a celebrated lecturer regarding anti-slavery efforts. On February 12, 1865, Garnet made his appearance at the House. Near the end of his life, Garnet chose to live out his remaining days in Liberia. He was named the U.S. Minister for Liberia, dying two months into his term.


