"The Lord Will Build This House"

Psalm 127:1 says, "Except the Lord builds the house, they labor in vain who build it; except the Lord keeps the city, the watchman wakes but in vain." These words ring true in my heart, mind, and soul. It is our season to allow God to do what only God can do and that is build this church. And I am not referring to numerical growth but I am talking about spiritual growth. The house is us and not the bricks and mortar. The body of Christ, the ecclesia, is us. We are the ones who are called out of the world and into a marvelous, transformative community of believers who follow God radically and faithfully. In order to change the culture of this church, we must allow the Lord to build this house.

What we are going to do is become a people who love God with our actions and attitudes. We need to become a New Testament church that is solely interested in making disciples and making sure we bring some heaven to counteract the hell people are going through. When one scours the book of Acts, one notices that the disciples of Jesus were fanatical and radical about making disciples. The disciples of Jesus were fanatical and radical about spreading the gospel of Jesus no matter what threats were made against them. The early church had their problems, but they quickly worked out their problems because they had their sights set on the big picture. The big picture for them and us is using all of our energies to increase the community of faith. Matthew 28:19-20 says, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." The epistle to the Galatian church says in chapter 6 verse 9 "and let us not grow weary while doing good, for in due season we shall reap if we do not lose heart."

In changing the culture of the church, each of us needs to remember our baptism. At baptism we were called into ministry. At our baptism we relinquished all ties to the world. At our baptism we made a covenant to follow Jesus no matter what. Our baptism reminds us that we are all ministers called to serve God by serving others. Therefore, every member should be involved in some form of ministry.

In changing the culture of the church, every member needs to be filled with God's Spirit. This is our only alternative. Galatians 5:24-25 says, "And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and appetites and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also walk by the Spirit." Being a member of the body of Christ means that we must walk according to the Spirit of God. Being a member of the body of Christ means that we must suppress the desires of the flesh, suppress the ego, suppress our will, and be led by the influence of God. Our guide is the Word of God. God has given us all we need to make this congregation healthy. Our medicine is the Word of God. Jesus is a doctor in the sickroom. Whatever ails us collectively or individually, Jesus is the remedy. More of Jesus is needed. That is why bible reading and heeding are so important. To change the culture of the church, every member, after reading God's Word, must begin to activate that Word into their lives and into the community in which they live. How can we operate in an authentic relationship with God and God's people without knowing the Word of God? It is impossible. How can one call oneself a Christian without knowing about Jesus the Christ? It is impossible. How can one talk about ushering in God's kingdom and know nothing about God's desire to rule the hearts of men as described in the scriptures? It is impossible. To change the culture of the church, all of us need to look and live the following words, "Therefore lay aside all filthiness and overflow of wickedness, and receive with meekness the implanted word, which is able to save your souls. But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves." James 1:21-22

Engulfed in a World of Guns and Violence

Color. A nation's palette of pain. Black. White. Brown. The reality of policing in America. The videotaped murder of **George Floyd** under the knee of former Minnesota cop **Derek Chauvin** is more than a question of justice being served equally. It's more than unlawful street violence vs. unlawful police violence. Or whether a police action is a justifiable incident. Or just plain tragic. It's about what happened to one of us ... can happen to all of us. In this nation of justice for all ... isn't one of us supposed to be all of us?

As a Chicago newspaper journalist since late 1968, visiting all of Chicago's police districts — as well as the unexpected tour of the violent crime section of the Cook County medical examiner's office — was part of a reporter's baptism. Crime was news; crime sold papers; and crime stories so popular, crime reporters had their own press office at police headquarters.

Then things changed early in my career. The police press room disappeared. Crime reporters headed back from their perch at the predominantly white CPD headquarters; returned to desks at their newspapers ostensibly informed by primarily white sources in their predominantly white newsrooms run by white editors and owners. It was the era of anti-war protests, which were becoming as common as dancing on a Friday night.

And now the ugly secret always known by the Black community is out: a long history of Black mistrust based on policing less fair for Black men and women. Only this time it took a nine-minute video to finally grab the nation's attention. Recent data showing Black men are more than two times more likely to be killed by police than white men may finally bring change.

It has become a warning to their children. The city is now engulfed in the world of guns; the killing of babies and young children shot in the backseat of cars, or at birthday parties or in their homes or in parks; the victims of gang violence, road rage, drugs and mental illness. It's a nightmare of poverty and desperation mixed with a salad of misery and crime. And good cops are going to be required to become even better. And we are going to need to make sure we truly get rid of all the bad cops. And guns need to be corralled or gone. And God help us all.

Little Known Black History Fact

Ella Baker



Ella Baker worked for over five decades as a civil rights activist and organizer, emerging as one of the most important female figures of the Civil Rights Movement. Baker was born on December 12, 1903 in Norfolk, Va., but was raised in Littleton, N.C. She attended Shaw University, graduating as its valedictorian in 1927 before moving to New York. While at Shaw, Baker challenged school policies which served as a precursor for the rest of her life and career.

While in New York, Baker briefly worked as an educator before marrying her high school sweetheart and joining the NAACP, working her way into directorship positions before stepping down in 1946. According to accounts, Baker felt hamstrung by some of the NAACP's bureaucracy, challenging her more grassroots approach to activism. In 1955, Baker began the In Friendship organization which combated some of the racist Jim Crow policies across the Deep South and raised money for the Montgomery Bus Boycotts.

This put her in alignment with Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in 1957, aiding the leader with his new organization, the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. However, Baker's time with the SCLC was also marred by what she felt was King's dominance as an orator but allegedly did not see him as an effective activist. In the late 60's and onto the seventies, Baker kept a low profile but remained active behind the scenes as was her preference. Notoriously private, few knew about her life outside of work.
