### "A Lost Cause"

According to Dr. James Cone's seminal work, <u>God of the Oppressed (1975)</u>, God has a preferential option for the poor and the oppressed. That is, God does all God can do to help alleviate the pain and problems of oppressed peoples all over the world. This is not to say that God doesn't love or care for middle class and wealthy people. However, Cone argues that our biblical tradition does not hide the fact that God goes out of God's way to uplift and restore marginalized and oppressed people.

Dr. Cone wrote the book to make academia aware that Black Theology is a legitimate discipline and contextually it is suggesting that since African-Americans are a part of the oppressed class, then God is on our side in our quest for full-equality and opportunity in America. Of course, he uses the scriptures to support his thesis using the biblical history of the nation of Israel, the Black experience, and the gospels.

He was onto something. When a serious student of the Hebrew and New Testament scriptures reads about the history of the fledgling faith community called Israel and how God had a preferential option for them, coupled with the ministry of Jesus who ministered among the marginalized, you can't help but to see that God is the God of the oppressed.

I say this to remind all of us that the church's mission to make disciples involves seeking to find those people who have been victims of oppression so much so that they don't trust anyone, not even the church. Life has been rough and rugged for them and, to them, God has been nowhere to be found. They have given up on "the good" and have feasted on a diet of cynicism, fatalism, and nihilism. The Christian church to them is viewed as another instrument of oppression, whitewashed to provide the foundation for a white supremacist ideology. They indeed are 'lost' but they didn't get lost by themselves. They have had some help. Our mission is to recover 'lost' people. We have people who are 'lost' in poverty; 'lost' in hopelessness; 'lost' in fear and anger; 'lost' in distrust; 'lost' in hate; 'lost' in chasing earthly treasures; and some are even 'lost' in the church.

Based on what the bible says, I feel that if God has a preferential option for the oppressed, the least of these, and the lost, then so should the church. When Jesus gave the Great Commission it wasn't presented as an option. It is a command. A mandate. Ask yourself, how many persons have you brought to Christ? How many persons have you brought to church?

There are people waiting to join a church like ours. They just have to be introduced. Won't you facilitate that introduction? Have a great week.

Early Symptoms of Diabetes

Did you know that diabetes affects about 9.4 percent of the U.S. population? Studies have shown that nearly 1 in 4 adults with diabetes (7.2 million Americans) are unaware that they have the disease. Another 84.1 million Americans have prediabetes, and nine out of ten adults have prediabetes and don't know they have it.

# Here are some early symptoms of diabetes to look out for:


- Hunger and fatigue.
- Being thirstier.
- Dry mouth and itchy skin.
- Blurred vision.
- Slow healing cuts or sores.
- Unplanned weight loss.
- Nausea and vomiting.
- Pain or numbness in feet or legs.

Warning signs can be so mild that you don't notice them. Specifically for type 2 diabetes. With type 1 diabetes, symptoms usually happen quickly, in a matter of days or a few weeks and are much more severe.

You are also more likely to develop type 2 diabetes if you are over the age of 45, overweight, or are not physically active. If you experience any of the above symptoms or anything abnormal, talk to your doctor.

### First Victim of 1919 Race Riots Will Get Grave Marker

On a sweltering Sunday afternoon in July, Eugene Williams and four friends hopped a produce truck to the lakefront. There they recovered a large raft they'd hidden and went out on Lake Michigan. The year was 1919, and the day was July 27, but it might as well have been this year and yesterday when it comes to explaining why Chicago is the city it is, and faces the problems it does. "A pivotal moment in the city's history, and significant in the nation's history," said Adam Green, an associate professor of history at the University of Chicago.

The raft drifted away from the "race's answer to Atlantic City," the Black beach at 25th Street and toward the beach at 29th Street, which white Chicagoans had staked out as their own private property. "He happened to float across a perceived line," said Green. A white immigrant, George Stauber, stood on the breakwater and began throwing rocks at the boys. One hit Williams in the forehead, and he slid off the raft and drowned. His friends rushed to a lifeguard, and then the police. A white officer refused to arrest Stauber, and stopped a Black officer from doing so. Seven days of riots followed Williams' death. People were shot, stabbed, stoned, pulled from streetcars and beaten to death, houses burned, blocks reduced to ruin. Thirty-eight Chicagoans died in the unrest.

"People lost a sense of existing within a shared civil community," said Green, referring to 1919, though it sums up too many situations today. "They engaged in this primal battle to enforce upon African Americans a subordinate place. We think of it in such macro terms, we lose track of the individual people. The 38 who lost their lives." Williams was buried in an unmarked grave. A century passed. Two years ago, on the centennial of the riots, Chicago magazine published a story by Robert Loerzel, "Searching for Eugene Williams", collecting what little is known of Williams' brief life.

"Just a regular kid like us," a friend recounted to an academic, half a century later. "A pretty smart boy." The article ends with Loerzel, a peripatetic historian, searching Lincoln Cemetery in Blue Island for his grave and finding only grass. "I thought to myself, 'That's not right,' " said attorney Scott Priz. "It is not right that this, the most consequential murder in Chicago's history. A kid's murdered in this incredibly tragic way, and there's not even a marker over his grave." Priz had a thought too few have. "I told myself, 'This is something I can actually help fix.' I want to fix this wrong." So Priz and others raised \$5,000, and had a marker made, which they are dedicating Saturday. The ceremony is particularly significant now, as state legislatures across the country throw rocks at our nation's actual history, trying to drive it away.

# **Little Known Black History Fact**

### **Bessie Stringfield**

Bessie Stringfield, better known as the "Motorcycle Queen of Miami," is a pioneering motorcyclist who broke down barriers for Black riders and women alike. The late Stringfield is historically known as the first Black woman to ride across the United States, riding well into her later years. Stringfield was born in Jamaica in 1911 to a Black Jamaican father and a white Dutch mother. The family migrated north to the United States and settled in Boston, Mass. Tragedy struck when Stringfield was just five-years-old, when her parents died. An Irish woman primarily raised her from that point on.

At 16, Stringfield was given a motorcycle by her caregiver, a 1928 Indian Scout. Three years later, at the age of 19, she embarked on the first of eight cross-country trips with stops at carnivals and stunt shows. She made a name for herself as a Black woman motorcyclist earning money on her long road trips. However, because of her race and gender, she would often have to sleep outside on her motorcycle because hotels wouldn't take her in. Stringfield was married and divorced six times but never had children. She kept the last name of her third husband, Arthur Stringfield throughout her career. As her carnival stunt career slowed, Stringfield shifted gears and worked for the U.S. Army as a civilian motorcycle dispatch rider during World War II. She was the only woman in her unit and was essentially trained as a soldier.

Although she was a fearless rider, she endured racist attacks and taunts including people attempting to run her off the road. The incidents made her stronger and she decided to not let the prejudice of others get in the way of her love of motorcycles. Stringfield eventually settled just outside of Miami, Fla. and worked as a nurse. Stringfield eventually founded the Iron Horse Motorcycle Club. She also still partook in races, winning one such event disguised as a man though she was denied the prize money when she revealed her true gender. It was in Miami where she earned her nickname and rode on one of her many Harley-Davidson bikes performing tricks.

Stringfield rode up until her death in 1993. She was 82. In 1990, the American Motorcyclist Association honored Stringfield in a Harley-Davidson exhibit. In 2000, the AMA named its "Superior Achievement by a Female Motorcyclist" award after her. In 2002, she was posthumously inducted into the Motorcycle Hall of Fame.


