Service of the Word

Confession and Forgiveness

In the name of the Father, and of the † Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another.

Kneel, sit or stand. Silence is kept for reflection.

Most merciful God, we confess that we are captive to sin and cannot free ourselves. We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. For the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, have mercy on us. Forgive us, renew us, and lead us, so that we may delight in your will and walk in your ways, to the glory of your holy name. Amen.

God, who is rich in mercy, loved us even when we were dead in sin, and made us alive together with Christ. By grace you have been saved. In the name of + Jesus Christ, your sins are forgiven. Then the first reading for this Sunday may be read, as follows.

FIRST READING: Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16

¹When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the LORD appeared to Abram, and said to him, "I am God Almighty; walk before me, and be blameless. ²And I will make my covenant between me and you, and will make you exceedingly numerous." ³Then Abram fell on his face; and God said to him, ⁴"As for me, this is my covenant with you: You shall be the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁵No longer shall your name be Abram, but your name shall be Abraham; for I have made you the ancestor of a multitude of nations. ⁶I will make you exceedingly fruitful; and I will make nations of you, and kings shall come from you. ⁷I will establish my covenant between me and you, and your offspring after you throughout their generations, for an everlasting covenant, to be God to you and to your offspring after you. ¹⁵God said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, you shall not call her Sarai, but Sarah shall be her name. ¹⁶I will bless her, and moreover I will give you a son by her. I will bless her, and she shall give rise to nations; kings of peoples shall come from her."

SECOND READING: Romans 4:13-25

¹³For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. ¹⁴If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. ¹⁵For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. ¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, ¹⁷as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations")-in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." ¹⁹He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. ²²Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." ²³Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, ²⁴but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, ²⁵who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

Word of God, word of life. **Thanks be to God.**



Then the gospel reading may be read, as follows.

Gospel: Mark 8:31-38

The holy Gospel according to Mark. Glory to you, O Lord.

³¹[Jesus] began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. ³²He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. ³³But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." ³⁴He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ³⁵For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. ³⁶For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? ³⁷Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? ³⁸Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

SERMON—Pastor Ida Iverson

"SAY IT CANNOT BE TRUE"

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.

Sometimes it would be easier if the lectionary would follow one chapter to the next. Except we have certain seasons that we follow over the year and it makes sense that at the beginning of Lent we have Jesus telling his disciples about what lies ahead for him. A few verses before, Jesus had asked the disciples who people say he is and after they answered, he asked them who they say he is. At that point Peter said that Jesus was the Messiah, the anointed one. It seems that the Messiah they wanted Jesus to be, was one who would overthrow the Romans and become a king who would sit on an earthly throne like King David had.

If we had followed the chapters between last Sunday to what we are hearing today, the disciples had witnessed his preaching, healings, driving out of demons, feeding of 5000, Jesus had even walked on water and been transformed in front of three of his disciples. With all that in mind why wouldn't they think that Jesus would become an earthly king? Peter also has a bit of history in all of this as well. He was one of the first disciples called and gave up his occupation as a fisherman to follow Jesus. He had jumped out of the boat when they saw Jesus walking on water and even took a couple steps before fear overtook him and he began to sink. He had wanted to stay up on the mountain and build dwelling for Moses, Elijah, and Jesus.

Yes, it would have helped with the flow if we had the chapters between one and eight, but that is not what we need to hear at this point. We need to hear from Jesus what is going to happen to him and hear at least from one of the faithful followers that reacted to his message. That faith we heard that Abraham had and how even Christians today believe that we belong to the covenant that God made with Abraham as part of the multitude of nations that came from him and Sarah.

I want to concentrate on Peter and not only his reaction to what Jesus told the disciples about what was going to happen to him, but how we understand Peter the disciple who was to become the leader in what we know as the Christian church.

This much we know, Peter was a Jewish man. He was married and whether he had children or not we do not know. We know he was married because Jesus had healed his mother-in-law. He was a fisherman, and you might call him an essential

worker, since fish would have been a mainstay of the people's diet at this time. He had to be strong to be able to pull his nets full of fish out of the water and into the boat. He also had to be knowledgeable in finances so that he was not cheated by those who bought his fish. He must have also been a man of faith because he knew that there was to be a Messiah that would come to save the Jewish people. He knows about Moses, Elijah, and the prophets, how else would he have been able to know that it was Moses and Elijah that they had encountered on the mountain. On top of that in his answer to Jesus about who people say he is, his answer is one of the prophets. Something else we need to remember is that Jesus gave him a new name shortly after he left his boat to follow...that name was Simon. With a new name also comes a new identity. Can we say that Peter is growing into this new identity that he has been given and it takes time to do that? You might even say he had part of one foot in his life as he takes Jesus aside to rebuke him that what he is saying just cannot be true. After all, if you are killed what am I doing here or any of us for that matter? It might be that after Jesus said he would be killed that Peter stopped listening and did not get the last part that after three days rise again or if he did nobody came back from the dead...and after three days you are dead, dead...no coming back!

When Jesus calls Peter Satan, he is not saying that Peter is the devil as we would take it to mean, but in the Hebrew the word means adversary, enemy or one who resists. Peter thinks that he is caring for Jesus, but Jesus is saying there is more than what they have witnessed so far and no matter what the cost. Yes, the mission that Jesus has is to not only bring the kingdom of God close, but it is to give new meaning...new life to the world no matter what the cost is.

That is what Jesus is also saying when he says that: "For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life?" In our baptism we are given a new identity. We are given a new name, that of Christian. In the rite of baptism, it speaks of faith, and those gathered around the one being baptized also profess their faith and they also promise to support the one being baptized in their new life in Christ. One of the opening prayer options for baptism is: "God, who is rich in mercy and love, give us a new birth into a living hope through the sacrament of baptism. By water and the Word God delivers us from sin and death and raises us to new life in Jesus Christ. We are untied with all the baptized in the one body of Christ, anointed with the gift of the Holy Spirit, and joined in God's mission for the life of the world."

It is what we do with that identity and that name given to us at our baptism. Jesus did not limit this knowledge to just his disciples, but called the crowd along with his disciples to hear his words and invited them to follow. To witness that there is not only death but also life in the cross. Are we an adversary, enemy, or one who resists, or are we willing to deny ourselves, taking on our new identity and the new life given to us to in the life, death and yes resurrection of Jesus Christ in whose name we are called by as Christians? Amen.

Nicene Creed

With the whole church, let us confess our faith.

We believe in one God,

Bring vindication for victims of injustice, exploitation, and oppression.
