³²Now the whole group of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one claimed private ownership of any possessions, but everything they owned was held in common. ³³With great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all. ³⁴There was not a needy person among them, for as many as owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold. ³⁵They laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need.

SECOND READING: 1 John 1:1-2:2

¹We declare to you what was from the beginning, what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked at and touched with our hands, concerning the word of life—²this life was revealed, and we have seen it and testify to it, and declare to you the eternal life that was with the Father and was revealed to us—³we declare to you what we have seen and heard so that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ. ⁴We are writing these things so that our joy may be complete. ⁵This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light and in him there is no darkness at all. ⁶If we say that we have fellowship with him while we are walking in darkness, we lie and do not do what is true; ⁷but if we walk in the light as he himself is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. ⁸If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. ⁹If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. ¹⁰If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us.

^{2:1}My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; ²and he is the atoning sacrifice for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the sins of the whole world.

Then the gospel reading may be read, as follows.

Gospel: John 20:19-31

The holy Gospel according to John. Glory to you, O Lord.

¹⁹When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁰After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." ²²When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." ²⁴But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." ²⁶A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁷Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." ²⁸Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." ³⁰Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. ³¹But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

SERMON—Rev. Pat Harris

Alleluia, Christ is risen Christ is risen indeed, alleluia.

Last Sunday, we heard the Good News. Christ is risen

And we heard the Alleluias for the first time Since Lent began back on February 17.

But what does it mean for you, today, that Christ is risen?

Is this just an event that happened 2000 years ago, Which was recorded in Four Gospels, Or does it have a real time impact in your life today?

You happily say Alleluia, or the Lord be praised, but is that rote? Does "Christ is risen" have a particular meaning for your life?

Last week, we heard from Mark's Gospel How the women were told that Jesus was risen, But they were too afraid to tell anyone.

The women certainly weren't shouting Alleluia To Jesus' disciples or anyone else. They were too amazed or too fearful To talk about what they had seen. They were afraid that no one would be believe them.

Last week, the excitement of Easter day Carried us through the incredulousness of the message, And left little time or thought for questioning the message about resurrection.

The remainder of these Sundays in the Easter season Give us the opportunity to ponder the resurrection message, And to observe the evidence of the signs That Jesus did following his resurrection. These Easter weeks give us the opportunity To wonder about the significance of resurrection In our own lives and in the life of the church today.

This morning, two phrases in our lessons jumped out at me As evidence of how Jesus' resurrection changes everything.

One from the beginning of the reading from John's Gospel And another from the beginning of the Acts reading.

John tells us: "It was evening on the First Day of the week, And the doors of the house, Where the disciples had met, were locked for fear."

Pre-2020, most of us, would not have been able to resonate With being locked in our houses in fear.

Now, we have all, to one extent or another, Experienced what it means to be confined to our houses, Fearful of an invisible virus that we may encounter outside, And the havoc it could wreak on our lives.

In the case of the disciples,

They were fearful, that they would encounter people in authority.

They were afraid that they would meet the same fate as Jesus, That they, too, would be rounded up, And held for trial and execution by crucifixion.

In that locked room, only ten were present. The traitor Judas was no longer part of their gang, And Thomas was likely out running errands, Rather than gathering with them.

By this time, rumors of Jesus' disappearance from the tomb And possible resurrection had most likely reached them.

But the rumors were not sufficient To dispel their fears. They were still huddled in the house, Locking the doors, and likely staying away from any windows.

The scaredy disciples were certainly In no position to carry out the work That Jesus needed them to do. Although these disciples had been told by Jesus, That they were to be his apostles, A word which means 'those who are sent', The message didn't quite stick. After Jesus' death these erstwhile apostles Are still trembling behind closed, locked doors, Rather than being out, demonstrating their "sentness".

The risen Jesus knew just what this fearful group needed: His presence and his reassurance.

The resurrected Jesus comes to this scared, questioning group, Stands right in the middle of them Offering them peace, Giving them the Holy Spirit, And one more time, sending them out, As he himself had been sent, by God.

Jesus did not promise his disciples/apostles That their work was going to be a piece of cake, But he promised them a sense of peace or well-being And the accompaniment of the Holy Spirit.

But what does this long past event Featuring the resurrected Jesus mean for your life?

Do you remember those weeks and months Where you were essentially locked in your house? Or maybe you are still sticking very close to home, Worried about a contagion that has been lurking in our cities and towns.

Can you access the feeling of terror As you watched the news, Clicked on your newsfeed, Or read the newspaper?

Can you feel the loneliness As visits with families and friends Were limited or restricted?

Even in your pandemic isolation or fright, Jesus has not left you alone, During these difficult months. As Jesus said to his disciples On the night before his crucifixion, I will not leave you orphaned.

Even if you were not able to be present in church, Jesus' presence in the Word has been livestreamed to your home. If technology is a limiting factor for you, You have been receiving worship at home materials, Including the preached word and hand-written notes, Bringing Jesus' presence to you.

The resurrected Jesus has given the gift of the Holy Spirit To all of his disciples, including you.

As Paul has told us, even in our despair or loneliness, When we don't know how to pray as we ought, That very Spirit intercedes for us With sighs too deep for words.

The Holy Spirit, given by the resurrected Jesus Has accompanied you during these past months, Interceding for you, Even during those months when you were in lockdown.

Jesus' original scaredy disciples, Sequestered behind closed doors, Comforted by the resurrected Jesus, Eventually morphed into Apostles, Who were sent by the Holy Spirit to begin the mission Of spreading throughout the world, The word about Jesus' resurrection, And his death for the forgiveness of sin.

The Book of the Acts of the Apostles From which we have readings during the Easter season, Chronicles the work of these Apostles, And the growth of the church.

One sentence from today's reading from Acts Really highlighted for me, The impact of the resurrected Christ.

In speaking of the church, Luke who wrote Acts, says: "Now the whole group of those who believed Were of one heart and soul." Those of us who are part of the 21st century church May find this picture of unity Very distant from our own experience of the church.

The church in the world today gives the appearance Of being very divided. We have hundreds of denominations, And even within denominations there have been splits Because of different opinions and theological interpretations.

We differ on things as diverse As whether we baptize infants, When we celebrate Easter, And whether we recognize the Biblical validity of gay marriage.

In addition, the divisive political environment in this country Has tended to conform the church to its ways, Rather than the church leading toward unity.

However, looking closely at Luke's words, He writes that the believers are of one heart and soul, Not that they are one mind.

These new believers were so shaped By the reality of the resurrected Jesus, That their hearts and souls had been conformed to Jesus.

In the church today,

We certainly have people who are of very different minds.

If you look at our church as a microcosm, I imagine that we have people at all points of the political spectrum. I'm sure that we have voted for different people in civic elections, That we listen to different new stations, And that we get our news in different ways.

Yes, we do hold differing opinions on flash point issues.

Yet we come together,

Because we share a common belief in the resurrected Christ, The teachings of Christ and Christ's presence in our lives.

Our hearts and minds have been shaped By the cross and the presence of the risen Christ.

In some ways, the church is one of the few places in today's society Where people holding radically different viewpoints, Can come together. Our unity is found at the foot of the cross, Where we share a common commitment to Jesus' command To love God, and to love and serve our neighbor.

Even though we may have different understandings Of the severity of this pandemic, We wear masks in church to protect our neighbor.

We get vaccines not just to protect ourselves, But to minimize the chance That we will spread the virus to our neighbor, And to minimize the opportunity for the virus To develop even more dangerous variants.

What does the Word of Jesus' resurrection mean for us today? What is the significance for us of the disciples' gathering, And the new believers being of one heart and soul?

Those gatherings on the First Day of the Week, Still occur two millennia after the original disciples locked themselves in, And our gatherings continue to be the forum Where you hear the good news of Jesus' death and resurrection, For the forgiveness of your sins.

Despite doubts, questions and differences of opinion, We still come together, Loving God and neighbor, And Jesus, along with the Holy Spirit, Still shows up, right in middle of our gatherings, Saying "Peace be with you".

We come together on the First Day of the Week, And you hear the words of the Risen Christ for you:

"Blessed are those who have not seen And yet have come to believe,"

"Blessed are you who have life in his name."

Nicene Creed

With the whole church, let us confess our faith.

We believe in one God,

who proceeds from the Father and the Son,

and the life of the world to come. Amen.

the ways of your love. Defeat in us our impulse to war. Bestow the peace of Christ upon those in authority and breathe upon them the Holy Spirit. Hear us, O God, **your mercy is great.**

You place within the heart of the church a spirit of sharing. Give us the power of your generous Spirit, that we provide for the needs of others. Announce your peace to those who are lonely, hurting and suffering, or afraid. We give thanks for all the prayers you have answered by the power of the Holy Spirit. Hear us, O God, **your mercy is great.**

You give us fellowship with one another in this faith community. Shine the light of the risen Christ in our life together, so that we live in love for one another, and our joy may be complete.

Hear us, O God, your mercy is great.

Praise to you for your joy of new life in the resurrection. Be with Alice Hansberry and Clay Chaffee as they celebrate their birthdays this week, along with Mike & Rosemary Mandrick on their anniversary.

Hear us, O God, your mercy is great.

You share the gift of eternal life. In thanksgiving and remembrance, we recall the lives and gifts of those who now live-in endless joy. Unite us with them in resurrection hope. Hear us, O God, **your mercy is great.**
