Service of the Word

Confession and Forgiveness

In the name of the Father, and of the † Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.**

Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another.

Kneel, sit or stand. Silence is kept for reflection.

Most merciful God, we confess that we are captive to sin and cannot free ourselves. We have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. For the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, have mercy on us. FIRST READING: Ezekiel 17:22-24

I will break off a tender one from the topmost of its young twigs; I myself will plant it on a high and lofty mountain. ²³On the mountain height of Israel I will plant it, in order that it may produce boughs and bear fruit, and become a noble cedar. Under it every kind of bird will live; in the shade of its branches will nest winged creatures of every kind. ²⁴All the trees of the field shall know that I am the LORD. I bring low the high tree, I make high the low tree; I dry up the green tree and make the dry tree flourish. I the LORD have spoken; I will accomplish it.



Then the second reading for this Sunday may be read, as follows. SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 5:6-10; 14-17

⁶So we are always confident; even though we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord—⁷for we walk by faith, not by sight. ⁸Yes, we do have confidence, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. ⁹So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him. ¹⁰For all of us must appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each may receive recompense for what has been done in the body, whether good or evil.

¹⁴For the love of Christ urges us on, because we are convinced that one has died for all; therefore all have died. ¹⁵And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them. ¹⁶From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. ¹⁷So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!

Then the gospel reading may be read, as follows.

Gospel: Mark 4:26-34

The holy Gospel according to Mark. Glory to you, O Lord.

²⁶[Jesus said,] "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, ²⁷and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. ²⁸The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. ²⁹But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come." ³⁰He also said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? ³¹It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; ³²yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade." ³³With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; ³⁴he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.

Sermon--Pastor Ida

"THE KINGDOM OF GOD IS LIKE ... "

Grace and peace to you from God the Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.

Jesus likes to use parables when he is talking with the crowds that surround him that come to hear him preach or when they come for healing. Parables are not always easy to understand; so many people, including his disciples, went away scratching their heads and wondering what he was trying to tell them. He does say that he explains the parables to his disciples later, but that still leave many people with questions.

This week, the Ezekiel and Mark lessons both deal with agriculture: Ezekiel with clipping off a piece of a tree and transplanting it to another location and with Mark, the planting of seeds and their outcome.

Now, I have admitted many times that I am not a gardener, but I enjoy the efforts of those who are. I had family members who were farmers and there were times that I helped to harvest the vegetable garden and even one year with the bailing of hay...that was the last summer I went to the farm. I have even milked cows by hand and when they finally got automation in the barn, I helped with that process as well. So, you might say I have a working understanding of what goes into farming. Even with our small gardens Marty and I planted, as our little patch of vegetables or fruit ripened I picked, canned or froze many pints and quarts through the years.

Have you ever thought about a seed and how there really is a great mystery involved in how it all works? A simple seed can be planted in the ground; it cracks open, breaks through the earth, grows, and then produces the grain, vegetable, or fruit, as well as new seeds, that will be used for the next crop. Many people do not know this, but there is a seed repository in Norway. It is called the Global Seed Vault, or the "Doomsday" Vault, and holds over 930,000 different seeds from around the world for food crops. It almost boggles the imagination of a person how there can be that many different varieties of seeds. Except when you think about the diversity of climates and varieties of foods that are grown around the world and the number of years, and today with all the genetic engineering of plant life, it might not be all that hard to imagine.

Let us go back to our lessons for today though. With Ezekiel, when you think about how one type of tree can be grafted on to another, or how you take a clipping from one plant put it in soil and watch it take root it can be amazing. One house we moved into years ago there had been a willow tree that had been cut down and the stump was left. A year or two later it started to look like there was a shoot of green coming out of the middle of the stump. Well, over the twenty-two years we lived in the community, we watched as a new willow tree grew out of that stump. What a mystery of how that could have happened, but it also is a sign of hope. Birds nested in its branches; it shaded the house from the hot sun. What had seemed to be dead was alive again. Hmm, it seems like there is something biblical about that.

Now we look at Mark, and Jesus is telling those around him how the Kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground. Honestly, I just cannot imagine a farmer just scattering the seed on the ground. Seed has always been a very precious commodity; it is the difference between life and death. Even if you are scattering it on rich, good soil it does not make sense to not plant it and care for it. And yet when you are comparing it to the Kingdom of God, we are scattered around the world, different varieties and cultures, and we grow and thrive wherever we are planted so to speak. What a mystery that is.

Then thinking about the mustard seed that at the time was one of the smallest seeds and yet when planted it would grow into this great shrub and take over great sections of ground. I suddenly thought about how a small community, usually because of its location, would grow into a large metropolitan area, ever-expanding and taking over large sections of land. If you think about it, it truly is a mystery that we may never comprehend.

Yet, within that mystery there is hope. Hope that life continues. That there will be a new harvest and that there will be seeds to plant or scatter for the next harvest. That the Kingdom of God is ever present and shows itself in many and various ways. Sometime in our selfish ways we forget how blessed we are. How the continuum of life goes on, despite us.

Just as I cannot explain the mystery of how a seed or a cutting from a tree or plant can be placed in the ground and it can grow, nor can I explain the mystery of how the dead body of Jesus Christ could be placed in a tomb and three days later he was alive. But I believe he did rise from the dead, and that belief gives me hope and I have no problem living with the mystery of God and his Kingdom.


This past year has held a great deal of mystery for you and me and the world. I do believe that as a people of faith, we have held on because of that faith and there will be a great harvest to come from it, but it is not time for the harvest just yet. We are still in the growing season, the tree has not reached its greatest height, the stock is growing but the full grain has not ripened for the harvest, and the mustard shrub has not covered enough ground for the birds to nest under it and be protected. You and I we are still wandering around in the wilderness, but we need not fear because we know we are a part of the Kingdom of God. His is a Kingdom that has no end and keeps scattering the seeds and brings in the new harvest at the right time. Yes, how all this works might be a mystery, but it is a mystery full of hope just as there is hope in more than 930,000 seeds for crops sitting in a seed repository in Norway if the need ever arises. Yes, God's Kingdom might hold mysteries we may never uncover, and as Paul wrote, "for we walk in faith ... so if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; everything has become new!" It is in the words of the prophets and the parables of Jesus that lead us to new life in faith and a great harvest of hope. Amen.
