### Canoeing the Mountains - Part 3

In the book Canoeing the Mountains by Tod Bolsinger, the idea of the Lewis and Clark Expedition to find a waterway to the west coast has offered us new insight into living in this time. With orders from President Jefferson, Lewis and Clark were convinced that the Missouri River flowed to the Pacific Ocean. But as they came to the head waters of that river, and carrying their canoes over the next mountain, they saw the "horrible mountains" of the Rockies. Faced with a decision to continue into unchartered territory or turn back defeated, they chose to become adaptive in their leadership, move forward, and learn new ways of living off the known map.

By moving into the unknown Rockies territory, Lewis and Clark hoped to cross the western Continental Divide at Lemhi Pass. They knew that when they got to that point of their journey, they would be at the head waters of the Columbia River, and would be able to use their training and skills. But as they got to Lemhi's Pass, they became more aware of the "reality" of the geography; more mountainous, higher elevations with snow, and more dangerous than the mountains they had just crossed. They were now faced with having to learn and lead with new set of adaptive skills to help bring the whole team along with them to include the Corps of Discovery as well as Native Americans traveling with them. In order to press onward and keep the morale and hope of the whole group intact, Lewis and Clark had to deal with their own disappointments of unanticipated discovery.

It can be very disorienting when tough decisions have to be made to move forward. Often times as humans, we want to stay where we are or even return to what we know. We want to make the same decisions, do the same programs, and so the same activities. But in a new place and time, such as we are now in, the old ways will often fail because they are not a part of the new, the now. In order to learn new things within uncharted territory, there are four steps to help lead us through: First, go calmly (without having anxiety dictate our responses) and face the unknown. Second, recognize systemic issues that cause us to do things the way we have always done. Third, understand that we are all learning together in this new time and that there is no map or guidebook to consult. And last, learn to ask good questions.

How easy it would be to simply return to our pre-Pandemic lives! Do you remember what that looks like? To be able to gather when we want, and with whomever we want, and to go about our lives as we used to. But we are not able to do that because our world, and our perspective has now changed. By holding on to old assumptions and plans will keep us anchored to the past. Instead, we need to travel with the Spirit of God into this new time by lifting the anchors and hoisting the sails.

As we venture together into this new era of church life, we need to evaluate what core values we need to keep and hold onto. We need to also be wiling to let go of the things that have held us back, and identify those things that are not really working for us anymore. And this, my friends, is scary. Even for me. I am also uncertain like you are, and I just want to continue doing what I know best to do. But that is not what I am sensing from the Spirit of God. I am clinging to the hope that God is doing a new thing with our church family, with our community, and with our world. Even more so, I believe that God is planning great, new things for all of us that we cannot even begin to imagine.

I invite you to continue to pray for the leadership of the church as we seek to discern the workings of God in our midst, and as we seek to follow Christ into this unknown. Pray, also, for one another that we all might travel together, calmly and courageously, and living to serve Christ in new ways in this uncertain world. "I do not know what the future holds, but I know who holds the future" (Abernathy.) I do not know where we are going, but I trust God's guidance for us as we go. Some come along and join the journey. Pray, and keep watch for God is leading us to a new place.



### Healing Hands is proud to be teaching students the concept of healthcare as a Christian ministry.

Healing Hands has begun building *The JD and Lorraine Nicewonder Education Center*, a 6 bedroom dormitory with an Education Center, Wellness Teaching Kitchen, 4 office spaces, and a small meeting space. To kick things off, we received a **\$695,000 grant**, and were given two pieces of property directly across the street from our clinic, for a total of one acre from Dr. and Mrs. Sarfraz Zaidi and Ballad Health. BurWil Construction has begun work on the Center, and Baker's Construction is generously grading the site as a gift to Healing Hands.

For 6 years we have had students from the University of Tennessee College of Dentistry in Memphis rotate through our clinic. 4 seniors come every 2 weeks from Memphis to Bristol! We house them and UT pays a dentist to be their preceptor. Beginning January 2022, Healing Hands will be able to house 12 students at a time instead of the 4 that we currently house, and we hope to attract medical and pharmacy students as well.

At Central, the significance of the red carpet reminds us to be people who are led by the Spirit of Christ in our worship, in our service, and in our living. Please wear **RED** as we celebrate this special church day.



### IN-PERSON WORSHIP IS SUNDAY MAY 9, 2021 AT 10:00 A.M. IN THE SANCTUARY

It is exciting to be preparing to return to in-person worship on Sunday. But things will be different as we are working within the COVID restrictions and guidelines from the CDC. As we return, be mindful that we will be learning how to best do this, and we ask for everyone's cooperation in this. We do ask that if you are not feeling well, that you please abstain from gathered worship until you are feeling better.

For those who are uncertain about coming into the building for worship, we will be broadcasting to the parking lot on 106.7 FM. You will receive a bulletin, and a reminder for the correct station to hear worship. There will continue to be an online presence with pre-recorded worship on the church website on Sunday mornings at <a href="https://www.CentralPresBristol.org">www.CentralPresBristol.org</a>. Below are the guidelines that we will follow for in-person worhip:

- 1. Wearing of masks is required in the building. You will need to wear your mask correctly, which is covering both nose and mouth, being hooked around your ears and under your chin. You will need to keep your mask on the entire time while inside.
- 2. We will be asking everyone to wear silicone wristbands (provided) to help us to have a visual for those who have been vaccinated. There will be BLUE wristbands available, and we ask that you wear it when you are at the church. (The wristbands also have Central Presbyterian on one side and Love God, Love Others on the other, which makes them a tool for evangelism.)
- 3. There will be wristbands that are RED, YELLOW and GREEN to indicate how close others can be to you. RED will indicate that you are asked to keep a good distance away. YELLOW indicates that you prefer that others stand about 6 feet away, and GREEN indicates that you will permit people to be 3 feet away from you. But we ask that there is no physical touch which includes handshakes and hugs.
- 4. The balcony will NOT be open for worshippers and everyone will be seated on the main floor. Ed Updyke and the sound crew will be up there doing their job.
- 5. Pews are marked off to provide at least a 6 foot distance between family groups. The pew or area where you would usually sit may be unavailable. We ask that you please find another space to sit.
- 6. Singing will be permitted as a part of worship, but with your mask on. In order to sing with a mask, you do not have to sing loudly, but sing softly as we all praise the Lord together. Hymnals and Bibles will remain in the Sanctuary.
- 7. We will not pass offering plates as a part of worship. The Central Pres. offering box will be at the entry to the Sanctuary, and offering plates will be at the door to the choir area. You can drop your tithes and offerings as you come into worship or as you leave.
- 8. For children, there will be a Children's Message time at the front of the Sanctuary with Pastor Ann after which they will be invited to go out with an adult who will lead them in Sunday school time for the rest of the worship service. The children will then meet the parents and families under the portico outside as you leave. On Communion Sundays, they will be offered communion as a group.
- 9. There will be a nursery available for those under 3 years old. Leslie Mumpower and Courtney Reese will be the staff members and will be following guidelines as well. You may drop of infants and toddlers in the nursery for their care.
- 10. We will not be using friendship pads to sign in. Instead, we will be taking a picture of the gathering congregation each week as a record of those attending. This will allow for accurate contact tracing if we have an exposure.
- 11. In the church building, you are not permitted to shake hands or hug one another out of care for each other. Please respect one another's space.

We know that this seems like a lot of rules, and yet we have all been living with most of these this last year in some form. Please be patient, and cooperative as we are still a work-in-progress!



### **Recycling Opportunities at Central Presbyterian Church**

Central Presbyterian offers a few ways to recycle your used items to help others:

- Aluminum Cans Even though there has been a price drop, we continue to recycle cans. Please put them in the container under the canopy.
- **Cell phones** These are given to either Abuse Alternatives or the Bristol VA Police Senior Resource Center to use as 911 phones. There is a container in the church office.
- Printer/Toner Cartridges Bring any type of these and place them in the brown bin at the end of the office hallway.
- Eyeglasses and hearing aids We collect all eyeglasses and hearing aids and the members send them to be re-fitted for people who are unable to afford these vital items, here and abroad. There is a box in the brown bin for these.
- Sewing supplies and fabric that you may not need any longer is wanted for the Little Girls Dresses and Little Boys Shirts and Britches that are sent overseas, and for Stuffed Animals that are sent overseas to give to children who are receiving their vaccinations. Place these in the brown bin in the hallway.


