John S. Dixon In Concert at Central PC Wednesday July 14th 7:00 p.m.

It is with great excitement that I inform the members and friends of Central Presbyterian Church that we will host John S. Dixon, organist/composer, in an organ concert, **Wednesday, July 14, 2021 at 7:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary.** John is the Organist and Composer-in-Residence at Providence Presbyterian Church in Virginia Beach, VA, and as it happens, is the church that Ann Aichinger's parents attend.



John was born near London, England in 1957. He earned degrees at the Queen's College, Oxford and Harvard University. He moved to America in 1988 and has served at Providence Presbyterian since 1998. He has over 800 compositions to his credit, many of which are published. His works include choral, orchestral and both sacred and secular keyboard and organ music. John holds the Colleague Certificate of the American Guild of Organists, and currently serves as Treasurer/Councilor for Financial Affairs of the National AGO. In 2003, he was appointed Executive Director of the Academy of Music, a nonprofit community music school in Norfolk, VA.

John is currently involved in the "50-60-70 Project" in which his goal is to share his music in all 50 states between his 60th and 70th birthdays. John plays his own music, always a diverse program with something for each audience member to enjoy, and everything on the program is available in one form or another to audience members. Unpublished pieces are provided without charge, and published collections are offered for sale at a discount, or may be purchased from your favorite music store.

I became familiar with John's music when I attended the National AGO (American Guild of Organists) Convention in Kansas City five years ago. John had included one of his compositions in our packets with information on the back for obtaining more of his music for 'free'. As I am always one to take advantage of obtaining free music, I quickly got in touch with him and began acquiring more of his compositions. I found them to be very accessible, well written and appropriate for our worship services. You may have noticed that I play many of his pieces. Although I now have acquired over 20 compositions at no cost, I have also purchased several of his albums, never being disappointed in the music. The piece he gifted us with at the AGO Convention will be included in his program on the 14th.

Although I think of John as a friend, I will be meeting him in-person at the same time you will. We have emailed back and forth for 5 years now, so I am especially excited about finally meeting the man who has so generously shared his music with me...and anyone else who requests it. There are not many composers who are willing to share their music so freely. Please join us on Wednesday, July 14th at 7:00 pm for a delightful evening of organ music as written and performed by John S. Dixon. (Masks are required and social distancing will be observed.)

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Canoeing the Mountain by Tod Bolsinger - Part 5

Over the last few months, I have been reflecting with you on the book Canoeing the Mountains, and how the idea of the Lewis and Clark Expedition to find a waterway to the west coast has offered insight into living in this new time. In the midst of the pandemic and how life is changing so fast, especially in the church, we can learn much from their experiences. With their orders from President Jefferson, Lewis and

Clark, and the Corps of Discovery team with the assistance of native Americans, were convinced that the Missouri River flowed to the Pacific Ocean. They came to the head waters of the river and discovered the "horrible mountains" of the Rockies. They chose to continue on the adventure rather than return defeated.

Lewis and Clark and the Corps of Discovery arrived on the Oregon coast and found a way to the Pacific Ocean. It was not how they had assumed it would go. They had to learn new skills and ways of doing things as well as retooling cances when they found the western waterway. They had to keep their eyes on what was ahead rather than longing for what they had left behind. They discovered that those they met along the way (native Americans) were in fact helpful and friendly when invited to be a part of the journey. Lewis and Clark learned how to adapt their leadership, learned new skills to navigate uncharted land, and how to rely upon the wisdom of those who knew this area best; in particular Sacagawea and her son, John Baptiste (who was just a baby on this venture.) They had to trust the words of those who were not in a position of power to lead them into this new land. But for Sacagawea and the Shoshone tribe, this land was home. In the journey to the Pacific Ocean, several of the team departed to explore new areas along the way. John Coulter and two trappers went to explore the Yellowstone River where they found geysers and thermal hot springs that became Yellowstone National Park. The entire team was transformed by the journey. Everyone involved found out new things about themselves and what it means to continue moving forward - together.

Probably one of the saddest parts of this story is that Meriwether Lewis commits suicide on the way back to Washington. This journey took over two years, and the toll it took on individuals was significant. During the journey forward, Lewis' alcoholism and depression seemed at bay. However, with the return home and the looming deadlines of journals to be written and the expectations of creditors, he lost his sense of purpose. While on the expedition his focus was different, but on the return to his "normal" life" he was unfortunately led down a dark road. If only there was a way for him to continue forward; but that was not a part of the plan.

As we are living not only in this pandemic time where everything seems to still be fluid and moving, we are also living in a time of post-Christendom. A time where things in the church, and in the world, are in flux and need to be re-examined in order to have time to discern how God is calling us into a new time of faithfulness. As Lewis and Clark had to learn to listen to those from the margins, we, too, need to learn from those who are serving Christ from the margins and who are finding ways to engage with local communities, as well as seeing the diversity of our world and allowing the stories of others to impact our faith journey - together.

For us as the church, we are invited to focus on how God is calling us forward in faith, and to explore new opportunities for ministry and mission. We are to continue our journey together, hopeful for what is ahead, and not bemoaning the loss of the past. We also are invited to learn new ways and new options for faithful living as Christ followers. I am hopeful for our life together as Central Presbyterian. Yes, over the next decade and the generations to come, the church will change and shift and move in new areas. This is okay, as long as we go together as the people of God.

I hope you will continue to pray for the leadership of the church as well as for God's continual guidance as we explore new areas of ministry.

Christmas in July

We will be participating in the Christmas in July project through Communities in Schools with the Bristol, VA public schools. This is an opportunity for us to provide new clothes for those children of our community as they begin the new school year. There are two ways you can be a part:

1. **SHOP FOR STUDENTS:** Pick up a form from the table in the entry area and it will indicate the child's sizes, style, and color preferences so "adopters" can then shop for the student for the following items:

2 tops, 2 pairs of pants or shorts with elastic waist, 1 pack of socks, 1 pack of underwear

After shopping is complete, the items can be placed in one large bag per student with the shopping form attached to the bag, and return the bag to the church office by **Sunday**, **July 18**.

2. SPONSOR A STUDENT: Sponsor a student by making a monetary donation of \$75. High school students will be taken shopping to purchase their own school clothes. This allows CIS to meet the students' needs, ensuring that they get exactly what they need.

All donors are asked to spend approximately \$50 - \$75 for each student sponsored. By placing a spending limit on each child, we can ensure that ALL children in the home receive a comparable amount of items.
