COVID Update: MASKS REQUIRED

The Session met electronically on Wednesday, July 28 to decide about returning to masking while inside the church building. It was a unanimous vote to return to wearing masks while in the church building. This issue was raised due to the new CDC guidelines, which state:

"To maximize protection from the Delta variant and prevent possibly spreading it to others, wear a mask indoors in public if you are in an <u>area of substantial or high transmission."</u>

"Wearing a mask is most important if you have a <u>weakened immune system or if, because of your</u> <u>age or an underlying medical condition</u>, you are at increased risk for severe disease, or if someone in your household has a weakened immune system, is at increased risk for severe disease, or is unvaccinated. If this applies to you or your household, you might choose to wear a mask regardless of the level of transmission in your area."

The statistics in our area show a rapid rising of COVID cases. All of East TN and Washington Co. VA are in the "substantial or high transmission areas as per current CDC stats. Sullivan and Washington County, TN cases are up 221% and 329%, respectively, over the last 14 days. Hospitalizations are 62% and 75%. The *trend* is what is *very important*, not the actual cases. Bristol, VA City cases are up 42% and Washington County, VA 68%. Hospitalizations are up 41% and 90%.

Though most of our church family is vaccinated, we still have our children and those with underlying medical issues who are a part of our community to consider, as well as the possibility of even those vaccinated being able to contract the virus.

Therefore, **beginning Sunday**, **August 1**, **masks will be required while in the building**. We do ask that everyone abide by this guideline for the care and concern of the whole community. Coffee time and Lemonade in the Shade opportunities will be suspended at this time as well. Please take any precautions you need to take. Know that there is still the pre-recorded worship service, which is posted on Saturday evenings, and on Sunday afternoons, the recording of the Sunday morning service is posted online.

If you have any questions, feel free to contact Ann Aichinger or any member of Session. Thank you for your understanding as we seek to be flexible and compassionate in light of the rising crisis and concern.

John Dodge and Ann Aichinger gave a report on the July 8th Stated Meeting of the Abingdon Presbytery:

- The highlight was the reception of the new Presbytery leader, Rev. Ann Elyse Van Winkle who will begin as leader on August 1, 2021.
- Rev. Mike Klumpp will be the new pastor of both the Rich Valley and Locust Cove Presbyterian Churches.

With the COVID updates, there is a high need to have accurate records of those who have been vaccinated in the church family. It is important that everyone understands that wearing a mask, or not, in worship is according to best judgement. Because we do not have to wear a mask inside does not mean we all don't need to consider wearing a mask in public out of love and care for others. But masks do have to be worn in the church building during the week as the APPLE Preschool is in session and the children have not yet been vaccinated.

The Presbytery leadership event, Mountain Top, will be held on Saturday, October 16, 2021 at the Royal Oak Presbyterian Church in Marion, VA. The keynote speaker will be the Rev. Ray Jones, who is the General Assembly Director of Evangelism for the PCUSA. There will be several workshops offered during the event. A lunch will be available for \$10.

The Technology Committee's recommendation to upgrade the broadband in the church and in the Sanctuary was approved.

The Adult Bible Study Sunday School class will begin meeting on Sunday, July 25 at 9:00 a.m. in the parlor.

There will be Lemonade in the Shade on Sundays when worship is in the Sanctuary, and there will be coffee in the kitchen on Sundays when worship is in Central Hall.

MY PERSONAL FAITH

The Lord said, "Behold! I am doing a new thing!" These words echo from Isaiah down through the centuries to ring in my heart even now. If I have to choose one passage which guides my faith, I choose Isaiah 43:16-21. I love the image of God making a way through the wilderness in order to show us new paths. So often, I think we get stuck in ruts about "how it's always been done." And then I think about the God that we serve--the God of new life, the God who conquered death itself, the God who can make a jungle out of a desert waste-land. Whenever I read Isaiah, I have hope. Things don't have to stay the same, not if we have the courage to follow where God is leading. I can do bold, new, exciting things, if only I see what God is doing, right in front of me. Behold!

MY VISION FOR THE CHURCH

Going right along with the imagery from Isaiah 43, I often think of church life as a group, together on a pilgrim journey. We are all going to the same place--God's eternal kingdom--but the route that we take and the difficulties that we encounter are different. That is why it's important for us to be connected. When I am struggling along the way, I know that there are others who are there to offer encouragement and lend support. But there are times on the pilgrim journey that we find an impassable route or hit a dead end. I imagine that there are many churches who feel that they are there right now. The journey can be difficult, especially when we must forge a new path through the wilderness. My vision of the church is one where we are not afraid to try new things, to head in new directions. We serve the God of life, and that requires courage to do the brave new thing. I see my role as a pilgrim guide, helping and encouraging us to see what we can accomplish if we step away from the boulders of fear and discouragement that keep us stuck.

ABOUT ME

I received my call to ministry at seven years old, and I've been inspired to "work for God" ever since. I am married to Matt, and we have two dogs and two cats to keep us company. I am obsessed with Basset hounds. I love to hike, and my favorite color is aqua blue.

Reflections From a Rocking Chair.....

Who would have guessed that in 2019 Central Presbyterian would be a church offering in-person gatherings as well as having an online presence? Certainly not me. But as March, 2020 arrived, and we were no longer able to gather in person, we had to relearn how to conduct worship, meetings, and gatherings so that we could remain connected with one another. So many of you were wary of Zoom and said that you "did not think you could do it." But with a little help, we have had people attend Wednesday

night gatherings, Session meetings, and church committees by Zoom, and Zoom has allowed more people to be in attendance than if we only had in-person gatherings.

Central has a presence online connecting with people in many different places. For one, I know that my parents in Virginia Beach, and several of their friends, have connected with Central through the pre-recorded worship option, and have also joined our Bible Studies and Presbyterian Women gatherings. I also know that there is a group in Texas that has connected with us as well, plus (as Ed Updyke has kept track of) we have people on every continent who check in on our website and videos.

Since May 9, when we returned to in-person worship in the building, we have had an average attendance of 70 people each Sunday. U.S. statistics show that in-person worship attendance is on the decline especially with the availability of online and pre-recorded services, and this is in part the impact from having experienced a shut down for nearly 15 months due to the pandemic. We all got used to the idea of not having to get ready on Sunday morning to leave the house in time to get to worship. Instead, we enjoyed an extra cup of coffee and watched worship from our sofas.

It is important to remember that we need to be a part of the life of a local church, and attending in-person worship is the way to be a part of that life. Scripture reminds us that the Body of Christ needs everyone to be a part. For the body cannot say to the eye, "I have no need of you", or to the ear, "I have no need of you." Where would the gift of sight or hearing be? If the foot said to the hand, "I have no need of you," how would we be able to offer cups of cool water to the thirsty or care for those in need? The body needs each part to make it work at its best.

As followers of Christ, we are a part of an incarnate ministry. This means that who we are is about flesh and blood. God broke into our neighborhood, and our world, and came to us in the person of Jesus. We, as Christians, are contributors. We do not sit on the sidelines and watch. We engage. We give. We partake in Christ's sacrifice, by communing together. We sing. We encourage. We hug. We fellowship together. It is important then that we often get together with one another to share our joys and our concerns, and to see one another.

As a church family, we need you and your God-given gifts and talents, no matter how insignificant they may seem. For when we all are together in community with one another (both online and in-person), we can accomplish much more for the glory of God. As we are coming to the end of summer vacations, getting ready to go back to school, and with the regular routines of work, I hope that you will make the commitment to connect and be involved in the life of Central. We need you. We need everyone. For without all the parts, the church is deficient. We are called to serve together.

We will continue to offer the online option for worship, Bible study, and groups, and we are looking at having live streaming which means you can join us online as the gathering is happening in real time. I am grateful for technology and for those who know how to make things happen online. Having the option for online worship and gatherings is great for those who are home bound or who are unable to come out due to illness or schedules. It also offers us opportunity to connect when away on a vacation or a business trip. But there is something special in being with one another and to be in the presence of the Body of Christ that reminds me of our connections and our interdependence on one another. Being together and sharing our gifts and talents with the whole community helps to advance God's kingdom work, and our outreach to others.
