Here we are in the middle of Advent. It seems that each year these four weeks leading up to Christmas move faster and faster. But I think that Advent is one of those gifts given to Christians and is a call for us to slow down---to pause---to even take moments of rest. (I know that I am preaching to myself as I need to slow down and pause as well.) Advent invites us to reflect upon the coming of the Christ child as well as the presence of God in our lives and world. It is also a time for us to consider the return of Jesus and how we are preparing for that event.

The color of Advent is purple (the same as Lent), which is the color for royalty and repentance. Typically the hymns and music are in minor keys and more contemplative in their message. The scripture in the season does not have shepherds and babies---but instead focus on being prepared and ready for the coming of the Lord.

One way to approach Advent is to consider it to be a Spiritual Practice. To take those moments in our days and weeks leading up to Christmas to pause, to be silent, to ponder the incompleteness of our world which still faces conflict and violence, suffering on so many levels as well as the darkness waiting for the True Light to come in. Advent is a time to practice patience and kindness, gentleness and goodness---maybe to the stranger in our midst. Advent is a season to see the humanity of one another and also to recognize the image of Christ is one another.

Here at Central we have all kinds of events and activities. Yes, it is a busy schedule with things happening for all ages. But you do not need to feel obligated to attend everything. But choose what will help you in this Advent time to prepare for the coming of the Lord. Maybe it is worship each of the Sundays and to hear the words of scripture that call us to be prepared. Maybe it is to be in fellowship on Wednesday nights and to find a sense of community in Central hall as we share a meal together, make ornaments and share in the Nativity story. Maybe the Longest Night Service on Monday, Dec 19 is what you need to acknowledge the grief and pain of this world in the midst of the angel's song to rejoice. Maybe it is the Christmas Eve services---as we sing carols, and hear the Christmas story and sit in the dimness and watch the candle light fill the space.

I hope that you will take this season as a gift to you and your family. To receive it with gentleness and wonder as we draw closer to Christmas Day. As the season of Christmas approaches, may you and your family and friends, as well as all of the church family here at Central be blessed as we prepare for the Lord's return and celebrate our God who breaks into our world and moves into our neighborhood.

When dessert is over, Handel prepares to leave. Wesley offers their thanks to Handel for honoring them with his presence and presents him with the nativity. Just as Wesley starts to explain about the missing Baby Jesus, Charles Jr., the Wesley's son, comes in to save the day!

Central Presbyterian will be Sponsoring a Ukrainian Family

What an exciting time to be a part of Central Presbyterian Church! On Monday, Dec 5, the Session met in a Called meeting to hear about the option of sponsoring a Ukrainian family to come and be relocated here in Bristol, TN. The Session voted unanimously and with great enthusiasm to do this. So, as the paperwork is being filed through United For Ukraine (USA Government agency overseeing the Ukrainian refugee immigration) and as the family is given next instructions, we hope that you will be supportive in this mission.

The family we will be sponsoring consists of Igor Mashkin and his wife Ann, and their son Nikita who is 13 years old, and daughter Eva who is 8 years old. Currently they are in Odessa, Ukraine and living with daily bombings. Igor and Ann are both professional accountants with computer skills, and desire to live in the southeastern part of the US. They contacted the pastor at Celebration Church, and he connected this opportunity with us as a church.

At this point, what we know is that the family will move soon from Odessa to Poland, and then fly from there to Knoxville sometime in mid to late January. John and Linda Barker have graciously offered their basement as an apartment for them for several months. In the first 4-6 months, we as a church will be helping them to get acclimated to this area as well as helping them to get to appointments, classes, and to find employment. We will also be helping them connect with the other Ukrainians who are already settling here in the Tri-cities through Celebration Church's work since June, 2022.

As part of our work in caring for them, we will have a special fund for their expenses as needed. This will be a way to provide for them in acquiring an apartment and setting up their own home by summer. Also from this account, we will reimburse them for their flights from Poland to the US (estimated at \$4,000 total). and provide other needs as they arise. We need to have at least \$10,000 in this fund to secure their financial needs. If you would like to contribute to this fund, please mark your gift **Ukrainian account**. We will continue to be their support and sponsor for up to 2 years as they make Bristol their home.

This is a wonderful opportunity for us as a church to truly welcome a family who seeks safety, security, and desires a new place to call home. We are still learning the details involved, but the Session asks that you join us as we pray for Igor, Ann, Nikita, and Eva as they begin making the journey to a new life here in Bristol, TN.

Jesus said, "And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me.' " Matthew 25:40.

A Longest Night Service of Worship.

This is an opportunity for all who find this season difficult or tiresome, who feel the losses in life, and need a place to pause and reflect.

So why have a Longest Night Service? The Christmas season is often marked by expressions of joy, excitement, and happiness. It's



a time for family to gather, and for churches to worship pointing to the hope that is found in the coming of the Christ child. However, this time of joy and expectation can often overshadow the pain and hurt many experience during this season.

It's a worship service scheduled around the winter solstice (the longest night of the calendar) which is December 21. It is noted that this day is the traditional feast day for Saint Thomas the Apostle. This invites us to make some connections between Thomas's struggle to believe the story of Jesus' resurrection, the long nights just before Christmas, and the struggle with darkness and grief faced by those living with loss.

This service is a witness to all that the Christ child comes as a sign of hope in the face of despair. It is a way for our church family to acknowledge the various seasons of life that people may find themselves in. You are invited to come away from the busy-ness of the season, to reflect and remember, and to see that the light of Christ does come into our darkness. All are welcomed to this service. It will be about 45 minutes in length and held in Central Hall.
