Ponderings from a Rocking Chair

Central Presbyterian Church July 19, 2023

Recently I read a very interesting book entitled <u>Wisdom from 52 churches: Yearlong Journey:</u> <u>Encountering God, His Church and Our Common Faith</u> by Peter DeHaan. The premise is that Peter and his wife decided to take one year (52 Sundays) and visit 52 different churches in their local area. The only requirement was that the church had to be Christian. So they did not visit mosques or temples or synagogues. For each of the churches, they investigated the website and then attended one of the worship services (if they offered more). They attended mainline denominations as well as independent churches, large churches as well as very small churches. Each chapter is a reflection of their visit, how they were received as guests, what they encountered at each church and they offer a lesson learned. In my reading of this book, I, too, learned things about how we, at Central, can continue to improve our welcome and reception of visitors and guests.

The first message is people who show up at a church, as a visitor or guest, come with great anxiety as to how they will be received. Are they dressed appropriately? Will they be able to find the door to enter the building? Will they meet anyone upon arrival? It is important that finding the entry door is easy and open, and that there is someone to welcome them and show them the way to worship as well as to restrooms and other places in the church building that they might need to know. We do pretty well with having doors open and unlocked and having people in the portico area as people arrive for worship.

The second insight is while there may be individuals who are designated greeters, handing out bulletins and offering a welcome, everyone in the church needs to be a greeter and welcome those who are visiting. Not only to offer a kind word and a handshake, but also tell them your name and ask for theirs. Then after you know their names, take the time to introduce them to others in the church. The more connections made within a faith community, the better the guests feel in being a part of worship.

The third lesson is about making the worship experience easy to follow. We do this well with either words on the screen or one hymnal being used. We have bulletins available with the order of worship as well as activities happening in the church with contact information. We announce when to sit or stand, when we have the passing of the peace, and special things that happen within worship. When it comes to the Lord's Supper, we make it clear that all are welcome to share in the bread and cup.

The fourth message is regarding the website. It needs to reflect the reality of the church. I think we do ok with this, thanks to Josie Russell, who keeps our website and social media updated. How we are seen in the community affects how people see us before they ever arrive on the campus. We ask that when there is a posting on Facebook or on Twitter for an event or happening, please share it on your page so that the life of Central gets spread even further.

The last lesson is visitors and guests make their decision about the church in the first 5-10 minutes of arrival. This means that their impression is not determined by the music or even the preaching. But about how they are received from the start. If you see someone you don't know, welcome them. Even if they have been members for 30 years, it is important for you to get to know one another. Don't be shy. Be bold. Get to know one another so that we can be able to welcome others into our fellowship.

This book was written in 2018 and with Covid, so much of church life has changed. But some of these basic lessons are still applicable to who we are and how we welcome everyone into our fellowship. May we be truly a place that welcomes everyone to come and encounter the Living God, and to experience a loving faith community.
