Reflections From a Rocking Chair

At the end of June, I went with a friend to NYC for 5 days. We had a wonderful time doing all the usual tourist things, but what was interesting to both of us was how helpful and kind people were. So often we are suspicious of anyone else, and feel like

we have to navigate this life on our own. But when we got lost or when we found a nice restaurant or store to stop in, the people were kind and willing to offer assistance to us. But that they wanted to hear where we were from and what kind of things we had seen and

really more than that, they wanted to hear where we were from and what kind of things we had seen and done while in the Big City.

Recently at Food City, I was getting a few groceries, and waiting in line at the checkout. A man ahead of me was paying for his items, but his card would not work. His grandson was with him and holding close to his hip. When the cashier said that the card was declined, the man indicated that he could not get the items he needed. I was not paying a lot of attention, but when the man walked away without his groceries, I said to the cashier, "I'll pay for it. How much is it?" The total was about \$30. She sent one of the other staff members to get the man to come back. As he approached the cashier, he looked at me, puzzled, and then mouthed, "thank you." I told him that it was my pleasure.

The surprising thing is what happened next. After the man left, and I was paying for my own groceries, the clerk said, "you are the first person that has ever done that since I have worked here, and I have been here almost 5 years." I said, "Ever done what?" She said, "Ever paid for someone else's groceries when their card didn't work. And it happens a lot." I told her that I hoped I would not be the only one in the future.

As most of you know, we have been a very busy church family this summer. We have prepared to welcome the Moga family on Thursday as they are coming from Ukraine to Bristol to make a new home. So many people have been a part of setting up their apartment, and getting items needed for them. Though we have not met them, they are already a part of Central.

We have been challenged to work with Robert Taylor on repairing and refurbishing a neighbor's home and making it a safe place for the family to live. We have had several people be involved in that project. The family and officials from Social Services have been surprised at our willingness to help as needed.

We have provided clothing for children and youth in our community so they can start school with new outfits. This year, 20 children had bags provided and then money was given to provide for 14 more with clothes.

On one level these events are huge, in that we are impacting families for the good, and offering them new possibilities. But really, they are small scale events. We see a need, and respond with faith that God is challenging us to care for those ones in need.

We have made a commitment to be a Matthew 25 congregation, which means that we are challenged to live out the teaching of Jesus from Matthew 25:37-40: And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it to me.' The work of faith involves welcoming strangers, improving housing, providing clothing for kids, and responding to the needs as we see them.

I know not everyone can pay for someone else's groceries, but each of us can offer what we have. If you have resources that can be shared with someone in need, then do it. If you have time to volunteer at the food pantry or deliver meals or read to a child, then do it. If you see a need, respond with faith and offer that person hope. It is often the small acts of kindness that make a difference in this world. Thank you for your continued faithfulness and willingness to be the hands and feet of Christ in this world, and for responding to the needs of others.
