REFLECTIONS FROM ADA RITCHIE

Recently Ada Ritchie was selected to attend the United Nations Conference on the Status of Women in NYC. This conference meets annually for two weeks to discuss how nations are addressing issues that women face within their countries. She attended as a young adult delegate through Presbyterian

Ministries at the United Nations. This office works on global relations guided by decisions made at the Presbyterian Church USA General Assembly Conferences. Here are some of Ada's reflections on being a part of this conference:

"This year's conference was particularly significant, marking 30 years since the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action (Beijing +30) was adopted at the Fourth World Conference on Women. Many meetings focused on reviewing the implementations of the Beijing +30 document. The Ecumenical Women's group identified twelve major areas of focus for this conference: women and poverty, education and training for women, women's health, violence against women, women and armed conflict, women and the economy, women in power and decision-making, institutional mechanisms for the advancement of women, human rights of women, women and the media, women and the environment, and the girl child.

Some of the most powerful events I attended included "30 Years After Beijing: Survivors Reflect and Speak Up," the Town Hall Meeting with the UN Secretary-General, and the Civil Society in the Margins of CSW 69, as well as a meeting with the Cuban Delegation. These gatherings were impactful, largely due to the personal accounts shared by participants. A woman I met at the meeting hosted by Nigeria told me, 'To read a story is one thing, but to hear someone who has lived through it describe their experience is a whole other matter. Personal accounts live in our hearts in ways that stories do not.'

While all the meetings I attended were enlightening, the memorable moments came from conversations I had with those attending the conference and volunteers. At the church that provided housing, I heard the story of the artist in residence and the mural he created. The mural was inspired by his daughter, who lost her life to drugs after experiencing sexual violence. It documented the lives of those lost to violence and incorporated interviews with the families of the victims, highlighting their cherished memories. The artist, Michael Pilato, is currently working on adding sound to the mural so viewers can hear the stories of those portrayed. He mentioned, "The mural can be quite sad, but it is also very beautiful and hopeful."

During my time in New York City, I spoke with a woman from Malawi who was passionately working to increase the number of girls attending school and to combat the challenges facing the "girl child". This term primarily refers to issues such as child marriages and female genital mutilation. She shared that she started as a teacher and observed that as girls grew older and matured, many began to disappear from the classroom. If girls remained in school, they often faced bullying for not having access to proper sanitary products, with some resorting to using banana peels to hide visible signs of menstruation. If lack of sanitary products didn't hinder their education, the threat of child marriage often did; nearly half of the girls in Malawi are married by the age of 18. She emphasized the importance of education for girls in Malawi as a key to creating more opportunities. One story she shared was about a classmate who had dropped out due to early marriage. When they met again later, the friend was surprised to learn that she was attending college. The friend remarked, "You are going to be the one on planes, educating others and helping my daughters to be able to go on planes too." This moment stuck with her and ended up being a prophecy as she just flew on a plane to attend a United Nations conference to advocate for girls in Malawi.



I take seriously my responsibility to advocate for and share these narratives. A worship song called "For Everyone Born: A Place at the Table" states: "For everyone born, a place at the table, to live without fear, and simply to be, to work, to speak out, to witness and worship, for everyone born the right to be free." I believe this line accurately reflects what everyone attending this conference is fighting for and the passion driving their efforts. As a religious community, it is our responsibility to demonstrate God's love through compassion, mercy, and justice. I am so thankful to Central Presbyterian Church for making my attendance at this conference possible."
