Fall Sermon Series: "Soul Prescription"

Following our Philippians 4 series, I am planning a new series for the Fall called "Soul Prescription." The series is based on several Psalms. The book of Psalms, centrally located in the Bible, is God's "prayer book." It contains 150 prayers, including prayers of praise, thanksgiving, supplication, and lament. Because of its passionate and poetic nature, the Psalms in ancient Israel, throughout church history and today have been sung.

How do we respond to painful realities and process accompanying feelings of grief, anger, sorrow, and doubt? The Psalms offer words to express when life's sorrow and pain leave us speechless.

Some have been taught to suppress, deny, and cover up feelings. "Be tough", "Don't cry", "Wear your emotions on your sleeve"; essentially, live superficially and call it courage. This approach is not biblical or emotionally healthy.

Today, a current word on emotions is "Embrace your feelings". How you feel, more than any other index in your life, is who you are. A husband leaves his wife because he feels unhappy in his marriage, and he deserves to be happy. "You must follow your feelings." This approach is unbiblical and personally and socially unhealthy. God's approach revealed in the Psalms, and particularly in the struggle and brokenness of the Psalmist, is to pray our pain in God's presence and seek Him and His soul healing. The book of Psalms offers us God's soul prescription.

A Testimony from David:

When I decided to work at Amazon for the summer I thought I was in for six weeks of mundane work until school started again. I was going to keep my head down and get the job done. I could not have imagined that God would have me work eight hours side by side for days with Sam. Sam is a young Sudanese American Muslim. Sam learned I was a Christian and we immediately struck up a friendship. He wanted to know about Christianity. He wanted to know how my faith was different from Islam. God opened his heart to hearing the gospel and I had the opportunity to not only witness to him, but to explain that Isa (Jesus in the Koran) is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. I could tell he was frustrated with Islam because he told me that he feels like a failure every day and he can't shake that feeling. I told him that Jesus is the answer. We exchanged numbers and I plan to pray for Sam. I ask that you would pray for his salvation too! It is so true that God is always working, even in the most mundane moments of our lives.

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And at the end of Luke 7, we have a bizarre scene where a prostitute interrupts a dinner party and anoints Jesus' feet with her perfume. Why subject Himself to wild innuendo? Jesus did not chastise her for her rudeness or her sexual immorality. He looked into her eyes with His great compassion, discerned her faith and repentance, and embraced her expression of devotion.

I suggest in Luke 6-7, we get a glimpse into Jesus' heart and vision for His church. Jesus leaves the awestruck multitudes resumes an itinerant ministry to the poor, forgotten and lost to teach us His heart is not to build mega-churches but churches, large and small, with mega-hearts. The kind of church whose people, hearing and believing the gospel of Jesus, cultivate a mega-heart to share Christ and be His presence to the poor, forgotten and lost; a church whose love is broad and wide and whose witness cuts across racial, socio-economic, educational, cultural, and national lines. A church whose people are growing a mega-heart for Christ and His kingdom come.

How Do We Pray in These Days?

How do we pray with poignancy and efficacy for a people whose suffering is too terrible for the human mind to comprehend? How do we pray for our country and world in these remarkably crazy days? I humbly offer two simple thoughts.

First, we must ask God to help us see the suffering of fellow believers as well as fellow human beings. Jesus, when he told the story of the Good Samaritan, was very intentional with his use of words. All three men, the Priest, Levite, and Good Samaritan, as Jesus made crystal clear, "saw the man." The Priest and the Levite, "saw the man and passed by on the other side of the road." Sadly, this is how many of us view suffering. We see it, but what lasting impression does it really make? Ask God to impress upon us the reality of the pain and suffering that afflict so many others. Pray, using the words of the Apostle Paul, "I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death..." (Phil. 3:10).

Secondly, we must learn how to meditate on the more suffering, sorrow, and earthquakes. "Thanks be to Cross. Elie Wiesel, in his book, "Night" gives a God. He has given us victory through Jesus Christ our painfully inspirational account of his boyhood Lord." (I Cor.15:57) experiences in the death camps of Buchenwald, Buna and Auschwitz. "Never shall I forget that night, the first night in camp, which has turned my life into one long night..."

When he arrived at Auschwitz, he was faced with a tortured and hanged young boy. The prisoners were forced to march past him and look at him full in the face. Wiesel recalled that he heard a voice say behind him, "Where is God? Where is God now?" And Wiesel in his spirit, declared, "Where is God," He is hanging on the gallows!"

"God is on the gallows!" This is the message of the Cross. God is not immune to human pain and suffering. He became a man, walked the way of sorrows, to the point of death, death on the Cross. As our Savior and high Priest, He has declared solidarity with us in our suffering.

As we pray for our world filled with such massive suffering, may we seek to move our gaze beyond our own pain and others, to that "lonely, twisted, tortured figure on the cross... plunged in God forsaken darkness." Meditate on, "Surely He took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows, yet we considered Him stricken by God, smitten by Him, and afflicted. *He was oppressed and afflicted, yet He did not open His mouth; He was led like a lamb to the slaughter,* and as a sheep before her shearers is silent, so He did not open his mouth" (Is. 53:4,7).

The pain and confusion of suffering will not go away. but it will be more manageable considering divine suffering. And one day we can know, there will be no
