The Last Supper – Leonardo da Vinci's famous painting – springs to life



A 61-year tradition enters the spotlight again when First Presbyterian Church presents "The Last Supper," a living tableau of the last gathering of Christ with His disciples before His crucifixion.

Captured on stage, daVinci's famous *Last Supper* painting springs to life when Jesus says "One of you will betray me..." Sitting or standing motionless at a larger-than-life size table, members of First Presbyterian Church - the disciples each in turn voice private thoughts generated by the Master's shocking announcement. The church sanctuary is transformed into that "upper room" and the result is a breathtaking backdrop for a series of monologues that will arouse the conscience and touch the heart.

Performed every few years since 1961, this will be the 20<sup>th</sup> performance of the "The Last Supper" by Ernest Emurian. The presentation, which has become a community tradition, is open to the public. #### Session Highlights

Beginning in March, Holy Communion will be observed during the worship service on the first Sunday of every month. A donation was made for the purchase of 3 additional picnic tables, which have been delivered and assembled. A designated gift has been made to fund the following:

- Address electrical/wiring needs in the office

What difference does the resurrection make? What does a dead man, who claimed to be God and then validated His claim by rising from the dead, have to do with my life?

Jamifications of the Resurrection

If Christ rose from the dead, He really is who He claimed to be. Jesus, by all human and historical standards, lived a remarkable life. He was known for compassion, powerful teaching and miracle working. People marveled at His zeal, were amazed by His grasp of truth, and stood awed in His personal presence. And yet, many religious leaders have left such a legacy. If He had remained in the grave, Jesus would have been exposed as a religious con man or a wannabe messiah – one more self-appointed prophet with a God complex.

Jesus claimed He would die and then rise from the dead. "'We are going up to Jerusalem,' He said, 'and the Son of Man will be betrayed to the chief priests and teachers of the law. They will condemn Him to death and will hand Him over to the Gentiles, who will mock Him and spit on Him, flog Him and kill Him. Three days later He will rise.'" (Mk. 10:33-34) Christ's bodily resurrection is the historical validation of all His claims. The disciples who witnessed the actual resurrection of Jesus would spend their lives preaching the gospel of the Resurrected Christ, many of them dying for the veracity of the claim.

If Christ arose from the dead, defeating the power of death, we should look to no other for answers to everlasting life. Who has the answers to what happens when we die? Other religions and philosophies give insights into life, suffering and death. But which religious founder and spiritual guru can speak authoritatively about life after death? The Buddha, Confucius, Mohammed, and Moses have one thing in common: they all died, their ashes remaining in a tomb. Many people speculate about life after death. Only Christ defeated death.

Jesus Christ came from heaven humbly, lived on earth perfectly, died on the cross sacrificially, rose from the dead gloriously, ascended to heaven victoriously, and promises to come again triumphantly. The night before He died, Jesus said, "'Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God; trust also in Me. In My Father's house are many rooms; if it were not so, I would have told you. I am going there to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with Me that you also may be where I am. You know the way to the place where I am going.' Thomas said to Him, 'Lord, we don't know where You are going, so how can we know the way?' Jesus answered, 'I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me.'" (Jn. 14:1-6) As Christ alone arose from the dead, defeating the power of death, we should look to Him alone for answers to life everlasting.



selves now leading the Youth Group at First Presbyterian. Soon, jobs in mortgage banking led them out of town and out of state. And while they attended other churches, Tony never moved his member-

ship. Even the timing of their return to Kannapolis seemed ordained. Only a couple years after they built a house, Carolyn's dad had a stroke. Tony and Carolyn were able to move her mom into their home to care for her.

While his life hasn't been immune from its share of tragedy, Tony's faith has never wavered. 1993 saw the death of his father in September, and the loss of his son, Tony, in December. Ten years later, his granddaughter Heather, whom he and Carolyn had helped raise, was killed in a car accident. And ten years after that, Carolyn succumbed to dementia. In spite of it all, he sees himself as "lucky," and "blessed" with friends and family that love him. He also sees God continuing to work. When Heather's mom Faye lost her mom, Tony says he and Carolyn informally "adopted" Faye as their own. She moved into their home, and now helps look after him.

Tony chooses not to focus on the pain of his losses, but the pleasure that his loved ones brought him. And he is grateful for the church that "has always been there." Tony has served that church well – leading Wednesday Night meals, starting a coffee fellowship, and now cooking for those who are sick or shut-in. He loves the collaboration of church members and how an idea that one person has can blossom when others join in. His hope is that First Presbyterian continues with the fellowship and outreach of a "great church" with "great people." He shares words of wisdom handed down by his mom: "Relax and let the Lord do His work!"



Conrad Adenauer was elected to help rebuild West Germany from the ashes of physical and spiritual ruin following WWII. He once met Billy Graham. Adenauer asked Graham a strange question, considering Graham's evangelical convictions. Adenauer said, "Mr. Graham, do you believe in the resurrection of Christ from the dead?" Billy Graham answered, "Of course I do." Chancellor Adenauer said, "Mr. Graham, outside the resurrection of Christ, I do not know of any hope for this world." It was true in war-torn Europe in the 1940's and true today. The risen Christ is our hope!
