

At age 13, Alpha Carter walked into Faith Baptist Church and saw a young man sitting in the back, wearing a white shirt and a black suit and tie. She thought to herself, "That's the handsomest guy I've ever seen." Alpha and her family had just moved to the Faith, NC area. Ronald Barger – the handsome guy – had grown up in Faith.

The two dated before Alpha went to college and Ron joined the Air Force. When both returned home, they resumed their relationship and were even engaged for four months. A squabble led Ron to tell Alpha, "You can't tell me what to do," whereupon Alpha gave Ron his engagement ring back. But two years later, Ron was still pursuing - "Because I loved her," he says. When he stopped by Alpha's house one day, she had every intention of telling Ron to just leave her alone. But the words that came out of her mouth were, "When are we going to get married?" That was January, 1965. They wed in May of the same year. Ron and Alpha use their union as one example of how God has worked in their lives. Alpha had prayed about marriage – she didn't want to be an old maid, after all! – but after Ron's visit in January, she had no doubt about their union. Both Ron and Alpha came from households of faith. Church was a priority for their families and almost everything they did revolved around church activities. They weren't just "sent" to church, Alpha says, they were "taken." And they both remember their own professions of faith – Alpha just before she turned 6, and Ron as a young teenager. Alpha has "never doubted" that God was with her and believes that God prepares you for events in your life. She remembers as a child the death of her uncle in WWII. Her grandmother had previously lost two young children to diphtheria and Alpha wondered at how she managed to make it through.



Daily Thoughts for Christ-Followers From Pastor Eddie

Live out our gospel identity. The Christian, united to Christ by faith, has been given an entirely new identity. We are the beloved Bride of Christ who "...loved the church and gave Himself up for her..., to present her to Himself as a radiant church, without stain or wrinkle or any other blemish, but holy and blameless." (Eph. 5:25, 27) We should daily preach the gospel to ourselves, which means we remind ourselves, whether we feel like it or not, just "how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ" for you. (Eph. 3:18)

Commit to a life of spiritual surrender. *"I tell you the truth,"* Jesus says, "unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds." (John 12:24) What is true in the science of agriculture is true in the realm of the Spirit. When a seed dies, the potentiality of the seed explodes. Christ chose, in obedience to the Father's will and out of love for us, to be the Seed who died to achieve our salvation. In our daily Christian life, it is spiritual surrender to Christ which grows the seed of trust in Christ into the harvest of a transforming hope and love in us. The ascended Christ says, "'My grace is sufficient for you, for My power is made perfect in your weakness.' Therefore, I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me." (II Cor. 12:9)

Spend time with our Heavenly Father. Commit to a daily appointment with God. Declare personal and spiritual warfare on anything that keeps you from intimate fellowship with the Almighty. The frenzied pace of life is a great enemy of our soul. "Keep them busy" is the mantra of Hell itself. Life's pace not only steals time from spiritual devotion, but it is also a barrier to spiritual humility. The faster we go, the more self-reliant we become. The result is a spiritually superficial life, often coupled with a spiritual callousness to the brokenness around us. Spiritual disciplines – namely Bible intake and prayer – will cultivate intimacy with the Almighty and develop a heart for other people.

Intentionally grow a large heart for people. Do we have a heart for the spiritually lost? Do we even notice the brokenness that surrounds us? Remember the "priest" and "Levite" in The Parable of the Good Samaritan. (Luke 10:25-37) They not only refused to help the dying person along the road; they did not really even see him. Jesus is very clear that the priest and Levite observed the injured man, yet casually passed by on the other side. How could they notice, but not "see" him? An enlarging heart sees the pain of others. "Our neighbor," writes Hadden Robinson in his sermon on this parable, "is anyone we see, whose need God has put us in the place to meet."

How does your "sight and compassion quotient" measure up these days? True, if we grow large hearts for people, our lives might become far more complicated, yet joyfully meaningful. However, if we choose to narrow our heart towards others, either out of selfishness or past hurts, the danger is grave. As C. S. Lewis profoundly notes,

"To love at all is to be vulnerable. Love anything, and your heart will certainly be wrung and possibly be broken. If you want to make sure of keeping it intact, you must give your heart to no one, not even to an animal. Wrap it carefully round with hobbies and little luxuries; avoid all entanglements; lock it up safe in the casket or coffin of your selfishness. But in that casket—safe, dark, motionless, airless—it will change. It will not be broken; it will become unbreakable, impenetrable, irredeemable. . . The only place outside Heaven where you can be perfectly safe from all the dangers . . . of love is Hell."

"Seek first God's kingdom and God's righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." (Matt. 6:33) "These things" are God's good gifts to be enjoyed in this world. Pursue first things first.

But she also remembered that she never walked into her grandmother's house without her Bible being open. When Ron and Alpha lost their oldest son, Jonathan, in a car wreck his sophomore year in college, Alpha realized how her grandmother had persevered – her faith had sustained her. Ron relied on Alpha, his "rock," and God to get him through that time, too. They chose not to blame God, clinging to Jonathan's birth and his salvation as miracles from God. Time has helped heal their grief, as has realizing there are so many who



have faced similar losses. Alpha and Ron have faced other challenges, too, like the joys and heartaches of raising 17 foster children or the amputation of Ron's leg.

But there has never been a time when their church family wasn't there to provide what they needed or just be there with them.

Ron and Alpha joined First Presbyterian in 2007. They have served and attended many churches, but felt at home here after only two visits, when people welcomed them and later remembered them. Ron has twice served as an elder, and has worked to do repairs and woodwork for the church. He is especially grateful for the opportunities for spiritual growth that First Presbyterian has made available. Alpha is a consistent leader of preschoolers and kindergarteners in Bible Study, VBS or Sunday School. She is also active in the Ladies' Bible Study and on the Women's Council. Both enjoy delivering meals to our homebound on Wednesday evenings.

The Bargers have seen the importance of a faith-based upbringing in their own lives and in the lives of their extended families. Their wish for First Presbyterian is likewise – to see our children regularly fellowshipping, learning that which is of lasting importance and eternal value, while adults of all ages lead and guide them. Ron and Alpha dearly love Pastor Eddie and are excited for the opportunities for growth in our church, in turn allowing us to be a greater blessing to others. Alpha has felt God saying little things to her throughout her life. Here at First Presbyterian, the Bargers' quiet, humble, selfless service and their unwavering devotion to God and His word speak volumes!
